REVISION OF TREATY ASKED

SANTIAGO, CHILE, Nov. 16.—Bolivia's request that the assembly of the League of Nations at its recent session revise the treaty negotiated with Chile in 1904, after that Bolivia should obtain access to the sea, has provoked criticism in the Chilean press. It has been widely commented in official circles here.

Barros Jarpa, Minister for Foreign Affairs, in a statement published in the newspaper La Nacion, declared that Bolivia's action before the league foreign to our sovereign rights directed to obtain territories, the use of which will be considered in the future as an explicit manifestation of Bolivia's desire to interrupt the reality of the relations between the two countries.

"Bolivia believes it has a right in the Pacific; we believe that we have a right to a port, but not the right at any time Bolivia had rights in the war of 1879, these were recognized in the treaty of that country receiving in exchange that totaled more than 220,000,000. Bolivia should

nothing from Chile unless it is asked by the friendly road." By the treaty of 1904, Bolivia ceded the province of Antofagasta in which is now located one of the most important ports in northern Chile. Bolivia's original claim was presented at the second assembly of the league, but was withdrawn and again brought before the recent meeting at Geneva. The Bolivian delegates, according to information received here, charged, among other things, that the "treaty, imposed by force, deprived Bolivia of its only access to the sea and that actual state of things constituted a continual menace of war."

A commission of jurists was appointed at the request of the assembly to consider Bolivia's demand with regard to the scope of article 15 of the pact. The jurists reported that Bolivia's demand in the form in which it was presented was inadmissible; that the assembly cannot itself modify any treaty and that the revision of treaties exclusively the affair of the contracting parties.

La Nacion commenting on the findings of the jurists says Chile has gained a moral victory, but it "now owes a duty to obtain a clear statement regarding the intentions of the Bolivian government in the second phase of the question; whether or not its pretensions have closed with the retirement of the affair from the assembly."

TIFLIS SOVIET IS VERY ACTIVE

Tiflis, Nov. 17.—The Soviet government here is much more active than that of Moscow. It is a case of the new broom that sweeps clean. It has been supposed that, since the destruction of the democratic Georgian Republic by the Eleventh Red Army, last February, the government here was of the kind, locally called "ersatz" in Germany, that is a sort of harmless substitute for the real thing.

While in Soviet Russia, the Red flag and the bayoneted Red soldier are going out of style, these two attributes of new freedom are much in evidence here.

Automobiles whiz along, bearing red banners, these banners are like-wise flown from many public buildings and paces are strictly examined on trains by shabby persons armed

with knife and pistol, which every true-blue Communist has a right to wear.

Strange persons, probably intent on pocketbooks and forgotten or mislaid baggage, represent themselves as members of the Cheka, (committee against counter-revolution) when interrupted. This is quite a pastime with the young roughs. On the contrary, in greater Tiflis, the Cheka is a sunshade affair, and when it takes anything, it does so when nobody is looking. It covers its trail even when it makes arrests so thoroughly that the near relatives of the arrested are left in doubt.

Here, when the Cheka makes an arrest and later executes, near relatives are broadly informed, when they bring food to the prison, that the person in question no longer needs food, and they had best discontinue their visits.

One of the latest performances of the Soviet here was to start a brand new kind of finance. It set out to reform the currency and improve exchange and general commercial conditions, and took the short cut of arresting 700 of the leading merchants of the country. They were told they

would be shot within a week unless they made a contribution of 25,000, 500,000 rubles to the "sanitation fund."

They were short half this sum, about \$200,000 in real money. For the other half a committee was released to visit the Near East Relief where the sum was for in the form of a loan. As the loan was not made, the merchants returned to prison, and were later released, after giving promissory notes to pay the sum.

CALIFORNIA SHAKEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17.—A pronounced earthquake was registered on the seismograph at Georgetown university yesterday, the estimated distance of the disturbance being 1500 miles from Washington and probably to the south.

The tremors began at 3:51 p. m., attained their maximum intensity at 4:01 and ended at 5:05 o'clock.

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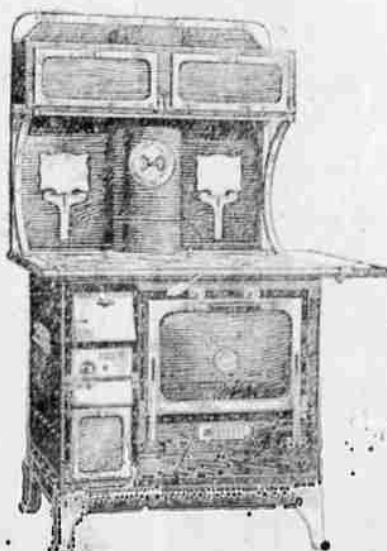
