

ARMISTICE DAY IS CELEBRATED

UNION, Nov. 17.—(Special)—At 10 o'clock Friday morning the joint celebration held at Union started. The parade, composed of the American Legion, Woman's Relief Corps and led by the Union Concert band, formed at the high school and marched to the M. E. church where a short program was held. Marion Davis, mayor of Union, gave an interesting address and several songs were sung. The high school Glee club served as a choir. After the services the parade formed and marched to the Union hotel where luncheon, a la army, was served to the soldier boys and the band.

At 1:30 the high school football team appeared on the field facing Imbler high. Union scored in the first quarter on some splendid line blocking and end runs which completed the scoring for the first half. Both teams made several downs in the first half. Score at the end of half, Union 7, Imbler 0.

The second half began with a rush and Union carried the ball to Imbler's twenty yard line. On the third down with several yards to go Imbler booted a beautiful place kick for Union's second marker. From then on the game was nothing but Union. Imbler put up a much better game than it has been playing earlier in the season and fought bravely all during the game, but was unable to stop Union. In the remainder of the third period and the last quarter Union put over three more touchdowns, making the final score 29 to 0, in Union's favor. In the last half Union's goal was never even in danger. Squires of Imbler did some splendid work and the whole Imbler team fought like tigers but unavailingly. Dallen of Union played a stellar game at quarter giving a splendid exhibition of wide end runs and broken field runs. He also let nothing by on the defense. His returning punts were worth seeing. Other Union men who showed to good advantage were Cook, Glycerie and Martens.

After the high school smoke had cleared away the North Powder town team and the Union aggregation took the field, playing eight minute quarters. North Powder kicked off and on a backfield fumble North Powder recovered and raced across for their only touchdown. The goal was converted. In the next quarter by some flashy end runs and forward passes Union went down the field for a touchdown but failed to convert. Score at end of half, Union 6, North Powder 7.

The last half found Union mostly on the defensive with North Powder lacking the punch to break them. Union was outweighted 15 or 20 pounds to the man and size was beginning to tell. Union held always before her goal line however and the game ended with North Powder on the long end by one point.

John Turner, Morgan and Croeland played well for Union and Jacobson starred for North Powder. Time was taken out about every minute for some victim that had K. O'd. Spectators said that it was the roughest game they ever witnessed.

The Union lineup was Davis, quarter, Wilson, fullback, Wakefield and McCann, halves, Skiff, center, J. Turner, A. Keckritz and R. Baker, guards, O. Turner and Billings.

PUBLIC INSPECTS NEW EQUIPMENT

The Home telephone company is holding open house this afternoon in their new building adjacent to the Foley office building making explanation of the new switchboard and equipment which is being installed.

At noon a luncheon was given to business men of La Grande with R. Miles, representative of the Kellogg factory, manufacturers of the new telephone equipment, as the principal guest. After introduction by S. D. Crowe, manager of the Home company, Mr. Miles explained at length the construction and operation of the switchboard.

While there was much of his talk that fell on barren ground owing to lack of telephone construction knowledge, he secured the principal feature of the new board as being of improved and greater advantage due to the call upon entering the board calls all operators instead of one, the continuous bell ringing device which is known as machine ringing instead of hand ringing, and the secret service the board gives.

He contends the operator cannot listen in on a conversation if she desires, also that the continuous ringing is of great advantage for as soon as the connection is made the bell of the party being called rings at intervals. As soon as the caller hangs up his receiver the line clears, and if he has not succeeded in getting his party he can immediately call central, doing away with the delays of being connected with a party who does not answer and not being able to disconnect.

The call to all operators is considered of great advantage according to Mr. Miles, because as the system now stands and as most systems are constructed, a call goes to a certain operator who has a division of the switchboard to answer. If that operator is busy the one who calls waits.

Under the new system Mr. Miles says the call goes into the board and any operator who is not busy answers it. Connection is made and when the operator presses a ringing button, the ringing continues until the circuit is broken.

Quite a number of people went through the new building and Fred Henning, the local telephone engineer was kept busy a greater portion of the afternoon pointing out the different departments and explaining the arrangements of the interior, as well as joining with Mr. Miles in explaining the technical side of the switchboard construction.
