GARDNER IS TO GO TO FT. LEAVENWORTH

Commissioner Hansen gave Gardner's bond at \$100,000 and then ask him the customary question regarding his ability to furnish that amount.

"I think I can make it," Gardner replied. Herman E. Indelicof of Phoenix, the mail clerk who was in charge of the car and who captured Gardner, was the first witness. He told of going to the car to prepare to go out on his run. He said he got in and helped out the mail on board. Then he changed his clothes, laying his revolver on a table while he did so. Afterwards, about 10 minutes before the train was due to leave for Los Angeles, he got out to get the mail from a drop box at the station, leaving his revolver on the table.

Confronted by Masked Man. When he returned to the car, he said, he was confronted by a masked man who pointed a revolver toward his head and ordered him to hold up his hands and to back into the corner. "I started backing but didn't hold up my hands," he said. "All the time I was trying to convince the masked man that there was nothing of value in the mail in my car. I don't know why I didn't hold up my hands."

When he got into the corner, he said, the bandit ordered him to lie down on his stomach and he started to do so. As he started to get down, he said, the bandit put his hand on the back of Indelicof's head and loved him. Then, he said, he started to straighten up but only got high enough to see the gun held in the bandit's hand.

"I made a grab for it and got his wrist," Indelicof testified. "Then we started scuffling and wrestling."

Took Gun Away. Finally, he testified, the bandit handed the gun from his right hand to his left and tried to club the clerk with it, but Indelicof caught that and, at last, he said, both fell down and continued wrestling but finally he got on top of the bandit and got possession of the gun. About that time, he testified, help arrived in response to his calls.

In reply to questions asked by Gardner, Indelicof admitted that the bandit had numerous chances to shoot him, both before and during the scuffling. Indelicof said he kept the gun he took away from the bandit until he turned from his run Wednesday, then he turned it over to the officers. He identified five cartridges as those he had taken from the gun.

Two of the cartridges had wooden ones and the others lead ones. J. E. Wilkie, special agent of the department of justice, followed Indelicof on the stand. Gardner explained according to Wilkie, that the wooden bullet bullets contained small shot but probably would stop a man without killing him.

EX-EMPEROR ON WAY TO EXILE HOME

per attempted a coup d'etat by crossing the Swiss border and reaching the town of Steinhausen, Hungary, where with prominent monarchists he planned to enter Budapest. The plot failed and Charles returned to Switzerland. Again, on October 22 last, despite his "word of honor" given to the Swiss authorities that he would attempt no further escapades, the former monarch and his wife, during the dispute over Burgenland, flew in an airplane from Lucerne to Oedenburg, Hungary, where Charles was received by an armed party of royalists. In a sanguinary effort to enter Budapest the Carlists were defeated. The former emperor and empress were captured and finally, at the behest of the Little Entente, placed aboard a British monitor in the Danube. On November 3, the ex-royal pair sailed for their future home in the mid-Atlantic. On November 4 the former Emperor, who had persistently refused to renounce his hereditary "rights" was dethroned and the Hapsburg dynasty was ousted from Hungary by a law passed by the Hungarian National assembly.

Banishment Bitter.

Napoleon's banishment in 1814 was no less bitter. The former Emperor Josephine had died and his living consort, Marie Louise, with her son, the little Prince of Rome, had gone from Fontainebleau to Vienna following the Emperor's abdication. Meanwhile the Allied powers had ceded to Napoleon the island of Elba in the Mediterranean and there as a "sovereign" he might have passed the rest of his life in peace and tranquility. Eleven months of retirement, however, sufficed to spur him to escape and new adventures.

He had been brought to Elba

aboard the British warship "Dauntless" on April 20, with royal dignity and consideration. On the night of February 26, 1815, with 1,000 followers he slipped out of Porto Ferrajo and then began the famous "One Hundred Days" in which he sought to regain the throne of France. He gathered strength in men and arms as he crossed the Alps and marched on Paris but his reign as a "constitutional monarch" was of short duration. Great Britain, Russia, Austria and Prussia declared him an outlaw and raised 150,000 troops to crush him. The last battle of Waterloo the following June saw the end of his power.

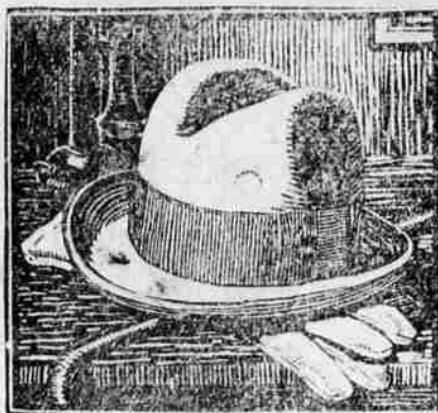

Napoleon's Case.

The former emperor threw himself upon the mercy of the British, falling in an effort to flee to the United States. He made overtures to Captain Maitland of the warship "Bellarophon" who took him to Plymouth, England, pending disposition of his case by the Allied powers. It was finally decided to send him to St. Helena and there, guarded by a strong British force, he landed on October 17, 1815. For six years he lived in practical solitude, writing his memoirs and monographs on military campaigns and political affairs, dying on May 5, 1821, of a cancer which had been aggravated by deep periods of hatred and depression. The British General Wilkie, the first governor of St. Helena, proved so lenient with Napoleon and "too

amenable to his influence," and, as a result, was displaced some years before the Corsican's death, by Sir Hudson Lowe.
