Luxuries As Costly As Military System

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Statisticians for the government have labored hard to bring the relative figures as to military expenditures and the amounts spent by the people of the country for amusements and minor luxuries out so sharply that their significance would be seen at a glance.

One set of tables shows that against \$418,000,000 spent for the army, the people expended \$334,000,000 in soda and confections and \$959,000,000 for perfume, jewelry, silk stockings and other articles for personal adornment.

The smokers poured out \$127,500,000 for tobacco in all forms. Baseball fans, theatre-goers, cabaret frequenters and those attending concerts paid \$897,000,000.

OIL COMPANY PAYS TAX. SALEM, Nov. 15.—The Union Oil company of California has sent to the secretary of state a check for \$22,248.08, covering the tax on the corporation's sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon in October. This money will be turned over to the state treasurer and credited to the state highway funds.

LUMBER DEMAND HOLDS ITS OWN

Weekly Review of American Lumberman Says Demand Up to Ten Year Average.

The demand for lumber continues strong. The lumber industry, broadly speaking, has made a very substantial recovery from the depression of the early part of the year. As illustrating this fact the American Lumberman in its weekly review points out that production for September was practically equal to the average production for that month for the last ten years. Lumber shipments, however, were approximately seven per cent greater during this month than for the average of the ten years while orders booked for September, 1921, were materially in excess of orders booked for September, 1920, and almost 20 per cent greater than for the average for the 10-year period.

"Retail buying," says the Lumberman, "is slowing up to some extent but the industrial business shows improvement. Crating stock, for example, is in very much better demand, indicating that manufacturers generally are finding a readier market for their product and consequently are in need of boxes and crates in which to ship. Railroad buying is also on the increase and the railroads seem to be willing to pay much better prices than earlier in the year. Some of the material is for repair work, but much of it is for new construction. For example, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad has placed an order for 2,500 box cars of the composite type having steel underframing and Douglas fir decking and siding. Railroad material is scarce and therefore the railroads are forced to compete for the material they need.

"Prices generally have shown little change this week. They continue firm, with here and there an advance, though on the whole the tone of the market indicates that the price situation is more stable than it has been for several weeks."

Valley Gripped In First Snow Storm Of Current Season

Snow began falling last night after intermittent flurries during the entire week and at a late hour this afternoon it was still falling, there being over seven inches on the ground at the level.

Reports from all parts of the valley are that it is snowing hard today. Coming this early it is likely that the snow will not last and will be of great benefit to farmers.

Trains were all on time today.

NEW PROPOSAL

BEND, Nov. 15.—That the county should be the unit for school administration and for taxation for school purposes, with the exception of districts of the first class, was the declaration this morning of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of education, when he addressed more than 100 teachers attending the opening session of the annual Deputies county institute at the high school building.

When he held a short time before the national grange meeting to facilitate various kinds of grange work. His plan might necessitate a change in national grange dates, but it met with the approval of many delegates.

The state master of Michigan also reported that the grange outlook for the future seemed very encouraging. Pre-war conditions are returning, he said. The state has been divided into seven grange districts with a deputy master in charge of each district. Mr. Cook pledged the complete co-operation of his grange in all matters of advancing the interests of the national body.

State Master Needham of Kansas reported that many subordinate granges of his state have local shipping associations through which they ship grain and livestock direct to terminal markets, saving for the farmers the speculative margins taken by local dealers.

Where there are no such associations, members of the grange are urged to do their own shipping, he said. Mr. Needham declared that the pooling of orders for staple supplies such as flour, feed, coal, fruits, potatoes, etc., was becoming more popular with farmers every year in Kansas.
