

BIG FOOTBALL GAME SOON

Oregon Aggies and University of Oregon Will Clash at Eugene This Year.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18.—One of the Pacific northwest's annual big football games—the clash between the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college for the state title—will be played here next Saturday, November 19.

Approximately 15,000 people are expected to attend. New bleachers, to accommodate the crowd have been built on Hayward field at the state university where the game will be played.

Both teams are busy this week practicing for the game. The "Fighting Aggies," as the O. A. C. eleven has been called, were favored early in the season to win, but Oregon took, which opened low, jumped when the local eleven held the strong Washington State Congress to a tie.

Saturday's game will be the twenty-fifth played between Oregon and the Aggies. Oregon has won fifteen the Aggies four and five have been tied.

The game will count in both the Northwest Conference and Pacific Coast Conference title races, but will have no direct bearing on the coast fight, for both teams were eliminated early in the season, Oregon by California and the Aggies by Stanford.

Days And Nights Are Long In Oil Fields

OTAWA, Ont., Nov. 18.—Residents of the Fort Norman oil fields recently discovered in the remote northwest of Canada along the Mackenzie river cannot tell when it is day or night. This is the result of the long periods of daylight.

It was brought out in an incident related by O. S. Flinn, of the Canadian Department of the Interior, who has recently returned from Fort Norman. On one occasion on his trip, a native greeted Mr. Flinn, asking the time of the day.

"It's 11 o'clock," was the reply. "Day or night?" inquired the native, with a languid glance at the sun which had been shining continually for days.

Mr. Flinn explained that the long sunlight periods apparently take away from the natives all sense of time and they eat when they are hungry and sleep when they want to without reference to what elsewhere are night hours.

Vegetables grow exceptionally well in the far north says Mr. Flinn, who attributes this to the long days. Potatoes, turnips, celery and ordinary vegetables yield excellent crops.

Two Sent To Pen For Forging Checks
