## TOKIO GUESSING ON U. S. STAND

TOKIO, Nov. 18.—Considerable speculation is being indulged here as to what will be the attitude of the United States toward demands which it is anticipated Japan will make at the Washington conference on fortification of the Pacific Islands.

"It is understood that the Japanese government has an idea of reducing its 'eight-eight' naval program to eight-four if the United States is willing to abandon her three-year building program and give up her Pacific fortifications," says Asahi Shimbun. "Such instructions have been given the Japanese delegation."

"What the attitude of the United States will be cannot easily be surmised. Judging from the spirit of the conference, the American government will not insist on the proposal to force Japan to reduce her capital ships to 10."

## Second Team Proud Of Its Victory

UNION, Nov. 17.—(Special)—Even if La Grande's first team is superior to Union's, the Union seconds have the edge on La Grande's seconds. The Blue and White came over confident of victory and went back wondering what had happened. Instead of an easy victory the Union team outplayed them and won 7 to 6.

The La Grande seconds scored in the first period and failed to convert the goal. A forward pass received by Martens scored Union's touchdown in the second period which completed the scoring. This is the second game for Union's seconds as she lost last week to Baker, 6 to 0. Next Saturday they will play Wallowa's second team and the following week will get a chance to come back at Baker on their own grounds. The Union team plays Wallowa next Saturday at Union and the week after take on Elgin at Union.
