THRIFT SHOP IS WELL SUPPORTED

Groups of Ladies Over the City Organizing for Red Cross Relief Work.

The Committee of women working under the chairmanship of Judge T. H. Crawford in organizing a Thrift Shop reports a splendid spirit of co-operation, not only from many of the women's organizations approached in the city, but also throughout the county. Since the conclusion of the war many women have missed the opportunity of getting together in some cause that was for the uplift or the relief of others and many have expressed the desire to get back again into the Red Cross work shop where as groups they could get together in the old time spirit of service to humanity.

The committee which has the Thrift Shop under organization at the present time plans to present to each group of women throughout the county the prospect of getting together on appointed days for the reconstruction of garments and the making of new articles which can be sold in the shop or provided without cost to those who are in need of such provision.

The committee recognizes its grave responsibility in putting the shop into operation at the earliest possible moment and is, therefore, making every effort to secure a suitable place in which to retail its wares. So far a place has not been found but it is believed that a location can be secured within the next few days.

Winter is coming on and the demands for clothing are rapidly increasing and it is, therefore, a goal that all who have garments or articles which could be given for the relief of the poor or sold for revenue in order that the purchase price may be used for such relief will gather their articles together, holding them in their homes until a place has been provided to receive them. Some provisions will then be made for their delivery to the salvage room.
