California Wins.
STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 21.—California's unbeaten football team dedicated Stanford's new stadium here Saturday by defeating the Cardinals 42 to 7 before about 67,000 people, probably the largest crowd ever assembled at an intercollegiate contest in the west.
 Playing against big odds the Stanford eleven put up the best game of the year, but they were unable to block the powerful California offensive, particularly off-tackle and center back by Morrison and Nisbet who tore through the red line repeatedly for large gains.

Center College Wins.
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 21.—The Center College (Praying Colonels) scored an easy 25 to 0 victory over Washington and Lee in a game slowed down by a soggy gridiron. Center used the aerial attack with a mixture of straight football. McMillan scored one touchdown for Center.

AMES, Iowa, Nov. 21.—The University of Nebraska clinched the Missouri valley title Saturday, defeating Ames 25-3.

EVANSTON, Ill., Nov. 21.—The University of Iowa Saturday plowed its way through a rain-soaked field to the western conference championship and to the championship of the middle west also, by defeating the Northwestern university 14 to 0, while Illinois was eliminating Ohio state from the race. The champion Iowans were held scoreless in the third and fourth periods and shoved over a touchdown in each of the first two quarters. The muddy field, with water a foot deep in spots made it impossible for the players to get a footing and both teams resorted to desperate forward passing attempts.

Ohio State Owned.
COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 21.—Illinois Saturday dashed to earth the hope of Ohio State for the claim to the western conference championship. The Illinois team, defeated by every conference team they had met this season, raced off the field victors by a score of 7 to 0. The feat was accomplished before a home coming crowd of more than 20,000.

LADD CANYON TIMBER TRACK IS PURCHASED

(Continued from page one.)

will be added until the plant is a perfect one and capable of producing 15 carloads of box shooks a week.
 The new concern will be under direct supervision of W. E. Moore, president and general manager of the company. He has associated with him P. S. Robinson, an experienced Eastern Oregon timberman, S. A. Baice, secretary-treasurer of the Imbler box factory, and A. M. Krauss, who owns a large block of timber in Ladd Canyon and who has been in the lumber manufacturing business for the past two years.

In a financial way Utah and Michigan people have become heavy stockholders bringing in the outside capital necessary for operation.
What it Means to La Grande.
 This new lumber plant will mean an additional pay roll for La Grande of 10 to 15 thousand dollars monthly when in full operation. There will be no town built at Lone Pine and men employed in the plant will very largely live in La Grande. Transportation on the paved highway will be provided because it is the belief of the new company that men are better satisfied when they live in a close by than when they live isolated lives. For this reason all employees will be encouraged to make their homes in La Grande.
 "We will begin work at once," said Mr. Moore to the Observer today, "for we have the details of the purchase worked out and now come the physical end, such as re-establishing the mill in the timber, removing the Imbler plant to Lone Pine and adding the additional machinery needed to make it a big concern. I am convinced that our combination of working heads is right and that is

the main thing in any line of business."


