

# ALL WALLOWA LAKES CLOSED

### No Winter Fishing Permitted According to Game Commission Order.

ENTERPRISE, Nov. 21.—All lakes in the Willowa mountains have been closed to winter fishing, it was learned Monday evening, when a letter from the state game commission was read to the rod and gun club. A few weeks ago the club was told that trout were becoming scarce in Aneroid and its basin for part of the year was suggested. The club went farther and recommended that it be closed for all the coming season, and that ice lake be opened for winter fishing.

In reply the commission wrote to George Rogers, deputy game warden, that winter fishing was considered bad practice all over the country and Oregon should not countenance it. The closing of Aneroid in the summer was opposed by A. J. McIntureff & Son of Willowa Lake park and by the forest service, which is nursing a project for the establishment by a Pendleton man of a resort at one or two of the upper mountain lakes.

Mr. Rogers said the forest service expected to construct a new trail to the lake net summer to make it more accessible. It is now reached by a very steep path. These mountain lakes have been stocked with eastern brook trout and the state commission wrote that these fish reproduce so rapidly that it did not believe that any summer closing was necessary. Aneroid has been open to winter fishing for three seasons under a special permit of the state commission. The snows which slip into the high mountains has been one of the striking winter sports of the county.

# UNION TEAMS WIN TWO GAMES

UNION, Nov. 21. (Special)—On a field covered with snow 17 inches deep and in a snow storm Union's football machine out fought Wallowa's undefeated team and held them to a scoreless tie. Wallowa made lots of yardage in the middle of the field but when it came to putting cover a touchdown the "old Union light" held them from scoring.

From past showings and comparative scores dope favored Wallowa to win by 35 or 40 points. Wallowa had won from La Grande 13 to 10 and La Grande defeated us 55 to 0 and Wallowa had run up 112 points against Wallowa while we had beaten them only 29 to 0. But the dope failed to take into consideration the Union light and the result was that Union let down Wallowa aspirations with a dull thud.

The first two quarters Union made practically as many gains as Wallowa, especially on passes and punts. The third quarter saw some brilliant playing on both sides and in the last quarter Wallowa, with one minute to play attempted a place kick from a position about 15 yards from the goal and directly in front of it. The Union line had been playing erratically all during the game but in this crisis of the game the entire Union line charged through and blocked the kick as one man. The whistle blew immediately after the kick and the game was over.

There were no outstanding stars in the game and only two knockouts were pulled during both games. The clean and sportsmanlike playing of both teams was a feature as both knockouts were clearly accidental. V. Johnson of Union in making a tackle was struck in the eye and one the same play a Wallowa man was shaken up enough to call time out.

As a forerunner to the first team game the Union second team demonstrated their superiority over Wallowa's seconds by winning 7 to 0. The winning touchdown came in the third quarter and was made on straight football. Union's interference on end runs was something worth watching. Union's goal was never even remotely threatened.

# BARGAIN SALE IN STAMPS

SHANGHAI, Nov. 21.—The United States Postal Agency at Shanghai is probably the only American postoffice that ever held what may be called a bargain sale in stamps. This happened this fall and was made possible by a fluctuation in the rate of exchange.

About a year ago as a measure of convenience for the public the American postoffice placed on sale stamps that could be purchased in the currency of the country, based in value upon the Mexican dollar. These new stamps called surcharge stamps merely were the ordinary two-cent and other stamps, but they bore in black letters on their face—for the two-centers—the words "Shanghai 4c China." Soon after these stamps were issued, by reason of a fluctuation in the rate of money exchange the sale of the surcharge stamps had to be stopped.

It was found that while a complete set of stamps could be purchased at the American Post Office in Shanghai for Mexico \$5.74, the same sets were being sold by collectors in New York at a rate of Gold \$10 and in London at three pounds. The American postoffice in Shanghai is the only distributing office in the world where these stamps may be obtained and they are issued from the Shanghai office only when the exchange rate warrants their sale.
