Germans Working Hard Says Lord Haldane

SHEFFIELD, Eng., Nov. 22.—Lord Haldane, who was in Germany a week or so ago says he found the Germans working hard. The had put aside all thoughts of armaments because they realized that armaments did not pay. They realized, however, that something which would pay was application of the science which they had learned before the war and which they would have applied in peace if they had not been interfered with by a small military party.

Now they were determined to be free from interference of the military party. The output of scientific books had become enormous. All classes of

people were working hard, and unemployed hardly existed.

They had no money except paper which had badly depreciated, and to restore their normal condition they had found work by taking in other peoples washing. He said he saw a large number of ships from Tynside being repaired in German dockyards because German dockyards could do "the work cheaper than the British workers."

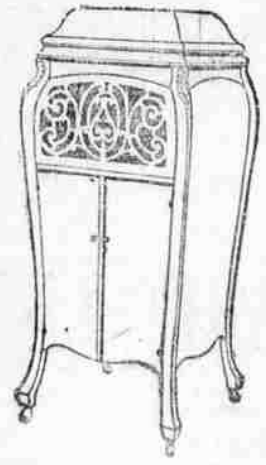
