 Norgard's introduction as a witness evoked a long argument and all he had been allowed to say when court recessed for the night was that Arbuclle once had offered him "a roll of bills" for a key to Miss Rappe's room at the studio, and that he had refused the offer.
 Both Miss Prevost and Miss Blake testified that after Miss Rappe had been found, moaning in Arbuclle's bedroom, she said, "He hurt me." To whom the pronoun referred was not made clear in the evidence. Much of Miss Prevost's cross-examination was given over to efforts by the defense to determine whether the prosecution had exercised any pressure on her in regard to the testimony she was to give at the trial.
 Miss Prevost said that while she did not particularly desire to make the statements in question, no force had been exercised to cause her to make them.

DEED OF GIFT JUST SIGNED

City of Paris Becomes Owner of Valuable Collection of Art Treasures.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—The deed of gift by which the City of Paris becomes possessor of the art collections of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Tuck, with 1,000,000 francs for their installation in the Petit Palais, Champs Elysees, has just been signed. Mr. Tuck is an American philanthropist, who has lived long in Paris.
 These collections include tapestries, tapestried furniture, furniture, pictures, china, Sevres and Saxony porcelains, Battersea enamels, watches and several articles connected with Benjamin Franklin.
 Of the tapestries, the principal piece is "Psyche led by Zephyr into the Palace of Love" and "Psyche showing her riches to her Sisters," manufactured at Beauvais, after designs by Boucher and formerly in possession of the Dukes of Marlborough at Blenheim.
 Among the furniture is a sedan chair, of unusual model, painted by Jean Berain, which was made for Madame de Chartres, niece of Louis XVI.


Red Cross and Salvation Army Work Out Plan

 hungry man comes along he is given a saw and only required to saw enough to pay for his meals, which are good meals and properly served by the Salvation Army at remarkably low prices. An order from the Red Cross is honored by the Army and all men sent in will be fed provided they will help at the community wood sawing.
 Cots are being secured and placed in the Army's headquarters, where a warm fire will be kept, and men without homes and without funds can sleep very comfortably at a low price, and that price is obtainable by the man if he will do a little work on the woodpile or other tasks which will be assigned him.
 The system also provides that every man must have a few meals to his credit to tide him over Sunday and the work tickets will be honored just as the best restaurant honors its meal tickets.
 It is argued that this will relieve La Grande from being a party to that degrading thing known as free charity in feeding and sleeping men—a thing that is recognized as doing more to pull down the morale and self-respect of individuals than anything else.
 Every man who wants to work all the time will be assigned some duty, and the man who needs a meal can always get it—if he will work.
