

### GAME SHIPMENTS MUST BE LABELED

The Bureau of Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture, calls attention to the fact that under Federal law all packages in which wild ducks, geese, and other migratory game birds are transported must have the name of the shipper and of the consignee and an accurate statement of the numbers and kinds of birds contained therein clearly and conspicuously marked on the outside thereof. Sportsmen shipping game birds without proper markings are liable to prosecution in the Federal court and the birds to seizure and condemnation.

W. F. Wright reports the uncovering of a valuable gold-producing quartz vein on his farm, less than two miles south of Applegate. The vein has a width of four feet and runs well in free milling ore.

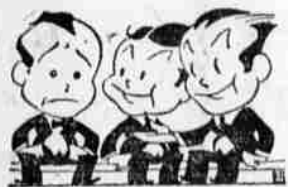
