 ly in the mountains there was little or no let-up in the snow.
 In Albany a steady rainfall brought the precipitation since Friday up to 6.08 inches. At that point small streams were rising rapidly and in the city many basements were flooded.
Torrential Rain.
 Torrents of rain were falling at Corvallis and it was near there that the Pacific highway was reported to be the deepest under water. Several automobiles had been wrecked as the result of accidents on the slippery pavement.
 From Salem it was reported that many of the small streams were going up rapidly, as the result of the heaviest rain in years.
LEBANON, Ores., Nov. 24.—One life was lost and heavy damage was done by the storm here Sunday night when this city was inundated by an overflow from the South Santiam river. A wall of water swept from the mountains 16 miles away, carrying away a head gate. The streets were flooded here and sidewalks were piled into heaps. Farms in the vicinity were cut into ditches. Rescuers waded through the water to rescue persons marooned in homes. A boy named Corlie, aged 19, fell from a bridge over the Santiam river at Jefferson and was drowned.

Noted Opera Singer Passed Away Tuesday

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 23.—Christine Nilsson, the noted operatic soprano, died here Tuesday morning. Christine Nilsson was one of the brightest luminaries of the operatic stage of a generation ago. Called by many the "second Swedish nightingale" as a fit successor to the marvelous Jenny Lind, she won triumph after triumph in the famous lyric roles of her day, both in Europe and America, being a frequent visitor to this country from 1870 to the time of her retirement in 1881.
 Born in Stockholm in 1843, she made her debut in Paris in 1865, as Violetta in "Traviata."
 Mrs. Nilsson married August Roussaud, of Paris, in 1872. He died 10 years later and in 1887 she married Count Casa Di Miranda.

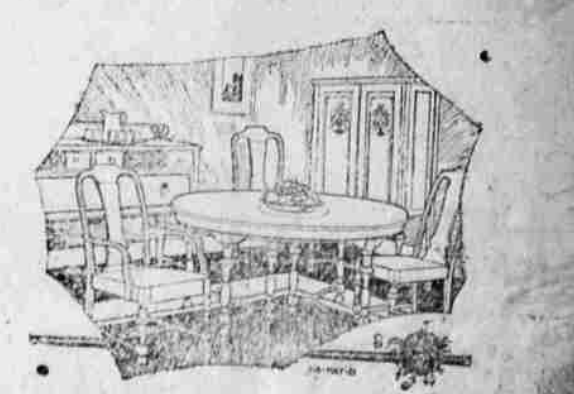
