RETRENCHMENT IN EDUCATION

TOKIO, Nov. 23.—Under the auspices of the Educational Protection League a general meeting of primary grade school teachers was held recently at the Female Crafts School, the chief topic of discussion being the educational retrenchment plan which is being considered by the government. The 700 teachers present passed a resolution to do everything in their power to oppose any cut in educational expenditure and forwarded copies of the same to the Premier and the Minister of Education. Copies of the resolution were also sent to members of the educational investigation committee and educational bodies throughout the country.

According to the Osaka Mainichi which publishes an editorial on the proposed retrenchment plan the authorities wish to put two teachers in charge of one class and have shorter hours and more classes.

"To take the toy from one hand and give to another," says the Mainichi is good enough to please a baby but not a nation. It then contrasts the amounts spent for armament and for education and concludes with the statement that "no wonder Japan is the object of suspicion and world-wide misgiving."

SHERRY TODAY AND TOMORROW

Of all the elements of play-writing, that of surprise is perhaps the most effective and at the same time the most difficult of attainment, according to experts.
