The orchestra was camouflaged with a gauze screen sprinkled with flakes of snow which dimly shrouded the music-makers. The array, the originality, the decorations and the individuality created an atmosphere that comes only with the air of freeness of a neighborly assembly of people on social bent. Such was the event of last evening which lasted from nine o'clock until one o'clock this morning. When the orchestra played its final number and the guests, tired but happy, left the ballroom for their homes.
