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IN BUSINESS IN LA GRANDE MANY YEARS

W. H. Bohnenkamp Today Celebrates His 25th Anniversary; Growth of House Has Been Steady.

On November 26th, 1896, W. H. Bohnenkamp started the hardware business now known as the W. H. Bohnenkamp Co., when he opened a small hardware store in the building which is now occupied by the Hoover store. Previous to that time Mr. Bohnenkamp had been employed as machinist in the railroad shops and when the old La Grande Hardware company closed their doors and moved their stock to Boise he immediately secured a location and sent for a stock of merchandise.

Sell from Open Boxes.
The first order for merchandise was given to W. H. Casey who now lives in La Grande and who was formerly with the Golden Rule Co. At that time Mr. Casey represented the firm of Feldman, Stone & Co., of Portland, carrying a general line of hardware, dishes, etc. Merchandise began to arrive about the middle of December and the first Christmas was most of their merchandise was sold from open boxes on the floor. A few months later they moved their stock to a frame building which stood where the present Bohnenkamp building is now located.

In 1900 the furniture and undertaking stock of the Palatka Furniture company was purchased. In the same year construction was completed on a three-story brick building. For some time the two upper stories of this building were used for offices and rooms while the down stairs and basement were used by the company. In addition the lower floor of the masonic building was used for the furniture show room.

In 1905 Mr. W. R. Jones came out from Iowa on a visit. Mr. Jones and Mr. Bohnenkamp had been old school boys and after seeing the country decided to locate here. He returned home and closed up his affairs in Iowa and came back and entered the business with Mr. Bohnenkamp. In 1917 Chase Bohnenkamp returned from college and was taken into the firm as a partner.

Fire in 1915.
In September of 1915 the Bohnenkamp building was partially destroyed by fire. Plans for reconstruction were at once made. In January of 1916 the present building had been finished. Another story was added and the whole building was remodeled to suit the needs of the business. About this time Hal and Wynne Bohnenkamp entered the business and Mr. Jones disposed of his interest. Hal had finished a course in the Barnes School of Embalming in Chicago and at once took charge of the undertaking business. Wynne made the furniture business his specialty. A residence chapel was built at this time in order to enable the firm to take care of its undertaking business in the most approved manner.

In the fall of 1917 a further expansion took place when the firm erected the garage building which they now occupy. This was made necessary by the rapidly expanding business and to enable them to give service on the cars and motorcycles which had been added to their lines of merchandise. Several years previous to this time when the building was rebuilt the masonic building which had been used by them as a furniture show room had been given up but in 1919 the furniture business had grown to a point where it was imperative that a down-stairs show room be procured. In order to do this the stock of the Christie Variety store, which then occupied this room was purchased and closed out. The new show room was refurnished, new window arrangements made and at the present time is one of the most attractive display rooms of fine period and over-stuffed furniture on the coast.

Constant Growth.
This history of the firm has been one of constant expansion. Business changes and new opportunities have made it necessary to add new equipment from time to time and it has always been the policy of Mr. Bohnenkamp to keep his business up-to-date at all times. For instance this spring there was an opportunity for some dealer to sell a considerable quantity of dynamite and other explosives to take care of the road work which is now under construction in this county. This opportunity was immediately grasped by the company. A fine new brick and concrete magazine was constructed which is a credit to the firm. Another improvement which has been added this summer is one of the new Burroughs mechanical bookkeeping systems. This is the latest thing in bookkeeping methods and by its use the firm is enabled to keep its books and accounts with the same accuracy and precision that the banks use.

While the active management of the store is nearly all in the hands of his sons at this time Mr. Bohnenkamp still spends a portion of his time there. Recently he has become interested in mining and has several properties in Baker and Malheur counties to which he gives a great deal of his attention. During the long period in which he has been engaged in the mercantile business in La Grande all of the old friends

who were in business here at the time have sold out or retired from business with the single exception of J. H. Pearce.
