LOSTINE, Nov. 26.—The Rebecca lodge will give a box social on Tuesday night, November 29th, to begin at 8:30, after the short lodge session, and the public are cordially invited to attend. There was quite a demand here for the La Grande Observer in this town during the blockade of trains from Portland. There were not enough to supply the demand. We all appreciated the fact that the branch line train made its daily trips and only a couple of hours late into Lostine Saturday and Sunday and was about on its schedule time on Monday, and has continued so. We were not entirely cut off from the outside world. We people of eastern Oregon feel the storm didn't damage us near as much as western Oregon towns were hurt by the rains, high water and silver thaw, and damage to telephone and telegraph service. Lostine's water supply was cut off for an hour or so Monday evening, but as soon

as it was reported to the council which was in session a couple of men were sent to the intake and found a mass of leaves had covered the screen box, and as soon as they were removed it was O. K.

S. B. Williamson, Chris Cook, Wayne Wade, Harry Wade and other cattle men from Lostine and other parts of the country left the latter part of last week on a final round-up of stock in the north woods or the forest reserve. The range rider had a good many already run into the feed pasture, but not all, and the big snow storm has made conditions critical. Though it is reported a good many cattle have drifted out of the timber and are ranging in the lanes down near Wallowa and some are drifting back to their valley ranches. There are various reports as to the depth of the snow in the timber between Lostine and Florn, some stating it at five feet and some as much as nine feet on Sunday. The Chinook and rain has probably reduced it there the same as here in proportion, for though Lostine had from 20 to 24 inches of snow on the level Sunday evening (and it would have been three feet by Sunday if it hadn't been so mild that the snow kept settling all day getting heavier as it fell), we now have only snow in spots. The surrounding hills are

bare and there is more mud than sleighing, and it still continues stormy, wind and rain, nearly all week.

The Missionary Society met last Thursday afternoon with Mrs. Jennie Crow. The ladies of the Enterprise society could not fill their appointment to meet with us owing to bad roads, and as they were to have rendered the program, an impromptu program was worked out by the members present. Mrs. Crow sang a solo, and after Scripture reading by the president the subject of Mexico was taken up, several articles on Mexican conditions read and discussed. The next meeting will be with Mrs. Candler on December 1st.

The little Peterson boy killed on the highway below Wallowa last week by the auto stage was a sad accident, but unless parents council with and caution their children about the danger, more will meet the same fate in going to and from school. It is the second accident to a school child this fall, the little Moffitt girl being hit by a car from Wallowa during fair week and it is reported that two little girls going down the highway from school in Lostine ran back and forth across the highway in front of an approaching car, until the driver had to slow down almost to a stop as he got up to them, as they con-

tinued to recross the road. That is playing at a dangerous game, and they need to be taught the danger.

There were about 36 out to Sunday School on Sunday morning in spite of the big snow, Alfred Miller and Chas. Bridwell were out on the main street with snow plows early but did not get to the side streets until nearly noon and they made another trip in the evening before dark. Rev. He held his regular service Sunday night and there was special Thanksgiving services at the church Thursday night.

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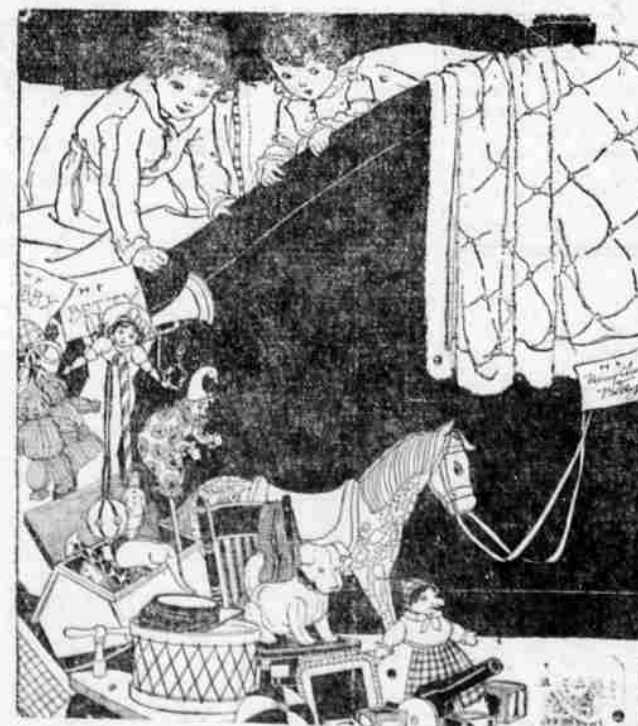
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
