SCREEN STORY NOW OPERA

On the eve of his arrival to personally supervise the direction of his story, "A Private Scandal," at the Realart West Coast studios, Hector Turnbull, noted playwright and novelist, learned that he has had the distinction of being the first author of a screen play to be produced as an opera.

DELEGATES TO VISIT PARKS

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—Delegates to the 1922 national convention of the United Spanish War Veterans at Los Angeles will be given an opportunity to visit the state and national parks of the west, according to an announcement by Oscar E. Carlstrom, commander-in-chief, who said he plans to fix the convention dates during the last 10 days of August. The dates were advanced because most of the parks of the west close in September. Commander Carlstrom said, in making the announcement.

In a general order issued from national headquarters here the new commander abolished the Washington office of the national committee on legislation. All Spanish war veterans were asked in the order to write to their senators and congressmen urging immediate passage of the Spanish war veterans' widows' and orphans' pension bill.
