law firm with which Colonel Whittlesby has been associated, received a wireless from Captain Grant of the Tolo stating that the colonel had left a message for him regarding some law papers. The note ended with:

"I will not return."
"Colonel Whittlesby has had so much grief confronting him since the war that I believe he could not stand it any longer," Mr. Little said. "Because of the prominence accorded him, widows and orphans wrote to him and appealed to him in person. Many seemed merely to want his sympathy, for he was a tender-hearted man."

"I noticed a change in him when he came back from the unknown soldier service. The funeral at Arlington seemed to be the climax to all the sadness he went through."

LEGAL HEAD OF NEVADA IS ATTACKED

ation. It cannot be delegated to any official to make the law unto himself and to select a victim for prejudice or caprice. That would be the end of free government.

"That no attorney-general in the long history of Nevada ever attempted to exercise such powers should settle the fact of their non-existence. That the present attorney-general has selected but one victim for this attempted extraordinary oppressive and eccentric interpretation and abuse of power amounting to present action against his existence, even in his judgment."

"The people of Nevada could have contemplated that it should be left to the temper, prejudice or caprice of any official whether or not the law should, or should not be applied, nor that he should combine the operation of the law to one person alone merely because that person was famous."

"Nevada has experienced herself in her laws as to the authority of her courts and the authority of other officials. She has given no power to attorney-generals such as the present attorney-general has invented. What the people have not given to him, the attorney-general cannot appropriate to himself."

"The recognition of that which the people have not authorized would demoralize and destroy judicial procedure and end orderly government. No instance can be cited where such an attempted seizure of author-

ity has been tolerated by any American state, nor can any case be cited in any country governed by the common law.

"The substitution of government by official prejudice and caprice for government by law means oppression and tyranny."

"In this instance the court having jurisdiction to which court the people and the state of Nevada had confined their interest in the matter has adjudicated the subject and has discharged its obligation to the state of Nevada, to the people of Nevada and its duty to society."

"No appeal has been taken from that judgment. No motion was made by the court, itself, to set the judgment aside."

"The judgment is final. The gratuitous and meddlesome action and interference by a stranger, in attempting to disturb the adjudication of the court by this strange and incongruous and anomalous proceeding, is, without precedent and without warrant in law and against public policy, and we respectfully submit that it is the duty of this honorable court to affirm the orders of the court below or to dismiss the appeal if the orders made are not appealable."

WINTER WHEAT CROP FAVORABLE SAYS REPORT

tricts, but in general the damage is negligible. The continued drought is causing damage throughout the lower plains region, where some fields are dying and late seeding are failing to germinate. Rain is needed to facilitate seeding and growth in most of the winter wheat areas of the Pacific Northwest.

The winter rye crop has made good growth, and the condition is generally good.

The picking of cotton is practically completed in all sections except that of northwestern Texas. A small amount of late bolls are opening in the fields and being picked. The yield has generally been low.

The Irish potato crop is practically all harvested and although the yield is better than expected in some sections, it is generally low. The quality of the crop is very good and less disease than usual is reported. The preparation of land for fall planting continues in Florida.

The digging of sweet potatoes is nearing completion. The yield has been cut considerably by drought in most sections, but the quality is generally good.

A good apple crop has been harvested in the Pacific northwestern states under favorable conditions. A good crop is also reported in Maine, but the yield and quality are poor to fair elsewhere in New England and generally poor throughout the central states. Recent rains have benefited the citrus crop in Florida, and it is being marketed freely. Citrus fruits are being harvested in Arizona, and oranges of very good quality are being marketed from Piquemines Parish, La.

Cattle are generally in good condition, and very little disease is reported. The milk production is reported to be somewhat below normal in Wisconsin. Hog cholera is being checked in Indiana and Iowa, but is still serious in Kansas and some sections of Nebraska and Illinois.

A large crop of peavine, velvet bean, and peanut hay is reported in Georgia. Pastures and meadows are generally in good condition throughout the country, considering the lateness of the season. Ranges are very dry in the west central and southern section of Texas, and rain is also badly needed in northern Missouri, Louisiana and Mississippi. Ranges in the Western States are generally good.

It is reported in Tillamook that the Hill interests, which have an option on the Salem Creek & Willson River railroad, will start work on the road before the option expires next June. The motive power will be electricity.
