been exerted in the government from influential quarters, where the belief is held that the only way to insure eventual adjustment of Germany's obligations is to stabilize her finances. The first part of this plan being the stemming of the flood of paper marks. The plan probably will entail deferment of Germany's payments and there are reports that the British member of the reparations commission has placed before the British government a proposal for a two-year or three-year moratorium.

France Obstinate.

PARIS, Nov. 30.—The French government, it was made plain Tuesday, is strongly opposed to the proposed moratorium for Germany's debts to the allies, the movement for which is understood here to be gaining great strength in British official circles. The French view is that Germany is not yet capable of meeting her reparations payments and will do so only given encouragement from allied sources to resist payment.

Another Alleged Crime Charged Against Potter

Charles Potter, recently bound over to the grand jury on a charge of larceny by bailer, has another alleged crime to answer for. Three forged checks are said to have been passed by him shortly before being sent to jail in default of \$250 bail money.

He has been identified as the passer of several of the checks by his victims. It is understood that those victimized were the Grande Ronde Valley house, Clint Van Fleet and W. M. Pierce, the latter a blind merchant.

GEESSE LAND IN FIELD AND FEED

Flock Drops Down on Starkey Ranch When Men Holks Away and Feeds all Day Long.

STARKEY, Nov. 30. (Special)—The big snow was nearly all melted when a Chinook wind struck this part of the country Sunday and Monday.

A. J. Sullivan's employe, Mr. Lucas, started over the mountains for Pendleton Monday with a band of horses and Marion Haggy was taking out some horses and cattle. Mr. Lucas picked up 11 head of the Tony Vey cattle that had strayed down out of the hills, being driven out by the snow.

One band of the Cunha sheep was caught in the mountains by the storm. They were taken out Thursday and down Birch creek and will be taken over to Echo for winter quarters. A. B. Burnett was engaged by Joe Kray, the camp tender, to help get the Cunha sheep out.

The grades along the river Tuesday of last week were so filled with snow that they were impassable and the mail stage had to ford the river six times and let down fences to get to Hilgard, not returning until Wednesday.

Several men of the neighborhood were out on the roads at work this week.

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RELIGION IS SOUGHT BY REOS

MOSCOW, Nov. 30.—"Religion is opium for the people" is the slogan which the Soviet government caused to be placed on a permanent stone tablet in the wall of Moscow city hall facing the Iberian chapel.

This little chapel stands at the entrance to the Red Square, and contains the ikon which is more sacred to Russian churchmen than any other in the entire domain of the former Czar. Consequently it is greatly frequented by ill persons and supplicants who have suffered all sorts of misfortune and reverses.

The stream of worshippers at the holy shrine continues in spite of the glaring sign which Bolshevik officials have erected. And the disregard for religion throughout Russia, as recorded on the tablet is clearly indicative of the failure of the Communist regime to lessen the regard for religion throughout Russia.

Communists are expelled from the party in large numbers for having their children baptized, or for being in a church or showing religious tendencies. At least these are the reasons given officially in many cities where the cleansing of the party is taking place.

In response to inquiries as to whether abandonment of religion had made it unnecessary for the American Relief Administration to send kosher food to Russia, a prominent member of the Communist party who is attached to the foreign office said food which Orthodox Jews can eat should be sent from America by all means as the political changes had not caused them to abandon their religion to any considerable extent.
