Mortality High Among Students At O. A. C

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 30.—(Special).—Student mortality—not actual death but the dropping out before getting a degree—is not high at the University of Oregon, according to figures prepared by the registrar's office.

Out of 2066 men and women at present enrolled on the campus 275 are seniors and 63 are graduate students, making nearly 17 per cent of the total. These upperclassmen have been in attendance for three years, and in securing a ratio necessary during that time and the resulting increase of lower classes.

There are 682 freshmen, 449 sophomores, 405 juniors and 149 seniors. The alumni records show a list of 2090 graduates since the first commencement in 1878, and former students to the number of 7000 who did not complete work for degrees but dropped out during the first, second and third year. This high percentage of completions is important when it is considered that seventy per cent of these thousands made their own way.

Mortality is caused by the failure of about a hundred each year to live up to the high scholastic standards of the university; by economic conditions; in a small number of cases by marriages; and in a few instances by the removal of the students' families to other states.

The 63 enrollment in the graduate school on the part of those who already have bachelor's degrees but are working for master's or doctor's degrees shows the tendency in Oregon for increased professional and technical preparation.

X-Ray Shows Ring In Woman's Stomach

CASPER, Wyo., Nov. 30.—An X-ray examination of a woman's stomach Saturday night solved a daring mystery, according to County Attorney Purcell.

Mrs. Eva Hammond, prisoner in the county jail, was placed in custody of a physician Saturday night while county authorities consider what method to pursue in recovery of the ring.

Mrs. Hammond was arrested after she had attended a dance Friday night, following complaint charging her with theft of a diamond ring valued at \$1200, last October. A tip from Mrs. Hammond's dancing partner led to the X-ray test.
