The Screen

"THE CUP OF LIFE" AT THE ARCADE TODAY AND SATURDAY

"The Cup of Life," Thomas H. Ince's latest special production for the Associated Producers, which will be featured at the Arcade Theatre today and Saturday, is both a colorful romance of Singapore and the East Indies and a tense, stirring drama which evolves around the racial dividing line between Oriental and Occidental.

From both an artistic and a dramatic standpoint, "The Cup of Life" satisfies the most critical demands. Of three, it is difficult to decide which is its outstanding feature, the excellent portrayals of the all-star cast, which includes Hobart Bosworth, Madge Bellamy, Niles Welch and Tully Marshall; the Oriental splendor and beauty of the settings and costumes, or the powerful and gripping dramatic situations and sequences which command the interest of the spectator.

The original story, by Carey Wilson, was adapted to the screen by Joseph Franklin Poland. Rowland V. Lee directed the feature under the personal supervision of Thomas H. Ince.

GARETH HUGHES AS VILLAGE ROMANES AT SHERIDAN THEATRE

Gareth Hughes, Metro's youthful star, proved that he is some romance on the screen in portraying the adventures of an imaginative youth in "Garments of Truth," a George D. Baker production for S-L (Arthur Sawyer-Herbert Lubin) Pictures, which yesterday began a two-day run at the Sheridan Theatre.

To Gareth Hughes as the romance hero goes the credit of once giving a character portrayal which in its naturalness and adherence to the part ranks with his works in "Sentimental Tommy" and "The Hunch." Mr. Hughes' acting is of that fine calibre which, while giving full sway to every situation, does so artistically as not to create the impression that the part is being overplayed.

The story is of a youthful villager who, finding life rather prosaic, proceeds to enliven things by inventing wonderful yarns for the benefit of his townsmen. As the village liar, he finally causes so much commotion that he is sent away to be treated, and his adventures in the realm of truth, far from being a relief, lead to such complications that the village fathers are at their wits' end until the budding romance furnishes an entirely unexpected and most welcome answer.

THEATERS STILL RUN IN RUSSIA

PETROGRAD, Dec. 2.—Petrograd's government theaters and opera have been spared the general demoralization which has swept Russia, through the good judgment and organizing power of Ivan Vassilievich Ekskuzovich. Since 1917, he has been director of the Academic Theater and head of the theatrical organization of Petrograd. He is a professional actor, but also an architect and mechanical engineer and has no interest in party politics.

When the theatrical organization ejected Ekskuzovich to be its head, Lunacharsky, the minister of education, recognized him as an ideal man to conserve and continue the theaters and opera. Actors, dancers and singers pledged themselves to keep out of politics and under Ekskuzovich the old organizations have been held intact.

The Academic Theater, on the Nevski Prospekt, together with the dramatic school, the ballet school and the theatrical museum and library which adjoins it, stands forth as an untouched island of old Russia. Glasses run on as usual in spite of limited food supplies and the lack of fuel.

Davidoff, the veteran comedian who has been the idol of Russian audiences for over half a century, lectures every day to the student actors on the traditions of the Russian stage. Barbara Ivanova Likhoshersova, the director of the ballet school, has held the position since 1884.

The American relief administration is establishing a kitchen in the dramatic school and will provide dinners for the young people who are in training to be future directors, composers, singers, actors, dancers and dramatists. Gregory G. Ismenko, who has been in charge for 33 terms, is director of the boys' school.

Many efforts were made by political leaders to commandeer the ten thousand costumes owned by the dramatic academy organization, but Ekskuzovich has been able to keep the supplies intact, with the assistance of Lunacharsky and the dramatic profession has won such confidence by its abstention from politics that both government and public will doubtless continue to protect the organization which has continued its work with great loyalty to art under most trying conditions.

Decree in Science Case Will Not Be Handed Down Yet

BOSTON, Dec. 2.—Supreme Court Justice Deane today took under advisement a motion in the Christian Science litigation by ex-Governor Bates, counsel for the directors of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, that decrees be entered to carry into effect the decision of the court in the controversy between the directors and the trustees of the publishing society. The court in a decision last week found that the directors had control over the trustees.

State Will no Longer Play the Goat in Collecting Bills

SALEM, Dec. 2.—In the opinion of Governor Olcott, the state of Oregon has played the part of "goat" long enough as a free collection agency. Hereafter persons desiring the return of a fugitive for prosecution on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses must deposit with the district attorney a sum sufficient to cover the expense incurred in returning the fugitive, this sum to be turned over to the state in the event a compromise is reached-out of court after the fugitive has been returned. This opinion is made clear in a letter addressed by Governor Olcott to all district attorneys in the state.
