IRISH TO MEET IN PARIS SOON

World Conference of Irish to be held in Peaceful France Instead of Troubled Ireland.

PARIS, Dec. 2.—The World Conference of the Irish Race to be held in Paris January 21, will bring together representatives of some of the leading families of France, Spain, Italy, Russia, Austria, the Argentine and other South American countries, the ancestors of whom were Irish. These families migrated from Ireland as early as the 13th century and became nationals of the various countries, although frequently retaining their Irish names.

All the Irish race organizations of the world will send delegates and President de Valera of the Irish Republic has promised to attend. An exhibition of Irish art will form part of the meeting.

It is estimated that there are 25,000,000 persons of Irish origin scattered throughout the world. The secretariat of the conference in Paris is working hard to reach the descendants of Irish families. Several hundred Americans whose ancestors were of Irish descent will attend. While there are to be only 200 accredited delegates, several thousands persons are expected in Paris for the week's meeting.

The convention will mark the resumption of an event which until the 13th century was an important yearly feature of Irish life. The last one was held in Ireland in the 14th century.

The cultural revival of Irish art and literature is the chief purpose of the convention. It is purely educational in character and in no way connected with the Sinn Féin movement or Irish political hopes.

The renaissance of Gaelic culture has, in the opinion of those arranging the conference received great impetus within the last 20 years, although little has been heard of this rebirth outside of Ireland. One of the aims of the conference is to inform those of Irish origin how far this revival has gone and to interest them in encouraging and furthering Irish art, literature and drama throughout the world.

The invitations to the "Aonach," or convention, have been sent by Mr. de Valera, himself. Fourteen of the largest countries of the world have already responded and will be represented by nations of Irish ancestry.

ORGANIZATION OF PUBLICISTS

TOKYO, Dec. 2.—A body of Japanese publicists including members of the two houses of the Imperial Diet, university professors, scholars, prominent publicists, journalists, business men and others, contemplates organization of an association for the purpose of directing the nation's sentiment toward the Washington conference.

The association will remain in existence throughout the session of the conference and will strive to support the attitude of the Japanese delegates. Efforts will be made to mould opinions along the following lines:

To insist upon the abolition of racial discriminatory treatment.

To insist on the prohibition of new defense work on the islands in the Pacific which is calculated to form a threat to other countries.

To insist on the maintenance of the previously concluded treaties and agreements in existence among the powers and already accomplished facts.

To oppose the idea of international control of China.

The above enumerated principles will form the main features of a resolution to be submitted to the forthcoming general meeting of promoters of the plan and are expected to be adopted as the platform of the association.

Among the promoters appear the names of Vice-Admiral Tokuma Kamezumi (retired); Dr. Gichi Soyama, professor at the Waseda university; Dr. Taro Tera, professor of the Toho Imperial university; Dr. Frank H. Allen, professor of the Toho Imperial university; Mr. Yasuaki Tono, a prominent member of the house of peers and Mr. Minoru Toyama, well-known publicist.

INTERNATIONAL FORUM PLANNED

RIVERSIDE, Calif., Dec. 2.—An open forum, international in its attendance, will be held here December 3, 9, and 10 on the question of development of the Colorado River under auspices of the league of the southwest. It will be a series of extraordinary debates of every phase of the controversy concerning development of the Colorado, and extending into an international discussion of policies of water and power development in general.

Every city and district involved in the Colorado river discussion will have its champion at the meeting. Simon Gamberger, former governor of Utah, will represent Salt Lake City. Deaver's interests will be voiced by H. A. Ammons, former governor of Colorado. Phoenix will be heard through Richard E. Sloan, former governor of Arizona. William Mulholland, chief engineer, will speak for the power bureau of Los Angeles.

Mexico will be represented through a delegation jointly from Sonora and Lower California states, confirmed by President Obregon. Public enterprises in general will have for their champion Sir Adam Beck, of the Hydro-Electric Commission of Ontario, Canada, and probably by Rudolph Spreckels of San Francisco. Municipal ownership ideas will be presented by Mayor Horace Porter of Riverside. Mayor Bartlett of Berkeley and other officials and civilians.

Leaves on Three-Year Cruise to Samoa

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 2.—The "Islander," a thirty-foot yawl manned, built and owned by Harry Pidgeon, Los Angeles yachtsman, has left Los Angeles harbor bound on a three-year cruise to Samoa and the Marquesa Islands in the South Seas, more than 4,000 miles from here.

"I expect to reach the Marquesa group in 10 days, and will remain there until the passing of the typhoon season before continuing to Samoa," Mr. Pidgeon said. "The yawl's course will then be due south for 2,000 miles, and then southwest across the equator to the islands."

Mr. Pidgeon laughed at the suggestion made to him before sailing, that he was risking his life venturing across the Pacific alone in such a small craft, and on such a long voyage.

"The pursuit of pleasure and experience are the motives which have prompted my voyage," Pidgeon stated.

Pidgeon, who had not been at sea until three years ago, built the "Islander" without assistance. It is said. When the boat was completed Pidgeon and a companion in the summer of 1920 sailed to the Hawaiian Islands, reaching Honolulu in 26 days.
