Glad He is Alive—

M. W. Kiddle of Island City, Or., registered at the Benson, is thankful that he is alive, having passed through the railroad collision yesterday without damage other than a shakeup. Mr. Kiddle, who was in next to the last sleeper on the train, says he felt a couple of hard jolts and when he inquired what was the matter was informed that everything was all right. However, when he saw a man being led past his coach window wrapped in a blanket, he got up and went out to investigate. Mr. Kiddle says that Mrs. Lloyd Cole, who had both arms and legs broken, was the most courageous woman he has ever seen. She said that she believed her mother and little son had been killed, but she heard her baby crying in the wreckage and she wanted the little one brought to her. The baby was dug out by cutting a hole through a cushion and laid in the broken arms of the injured mother. The surviving engineer told Mr. Kiddle that he could not move in his cab and the steam was escaping near him. The engineer managed to twist his head so that it protruded but he could not make an outcry. Eventually a passing trainman saw the head of the engineer and he was extricated from his perilous position. Mr. Kiddle says that Dr. Kern of Pendleton, on the train, applied first aid to the injured. One of the main difficulties at first was the absence of light and pocket flashlights had to be used for a time. Torches had to be abandoned because of escaping gas from the tanks.—Oregonian.

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of a contention by the prosecution that Arbuckle had a struggle with the girl in the room.

Fatty Is Nervous. Arbuckle was visibly nervous and paced in and out of the court room in a restless fashion. He had little to say. Friday's entire session was taken up with final arguments, instructions to the jury and jury deliberation. Gavin McNab, chief defense counsel, opened the session Friday with a continuation of his closing argument. He was followed by Milton R. U'Ren, assistant district attorney, whose summing up lasted nearly an hour.

Reign is Over. U'Ren referred to Arbuckle as a "Belshazzar sitting on his throne and pouring wine" during the party in the Hotel St. Francis. "Thank God he has been told, as Belshazzar was told, that his kingdom is divided and his reign is over," U'Ren said.

Asked at the cessation of final arguments what his future plans were, Arbuckle said he would make no statement "until the thing is out of the way." He remarked that the final argument of Gavin McNab, or "the old man" as he characterized him, had not been answered adequately by U'Ren. The prosecution reiterated its hope for a speedy conviction.

Alternate Juror Talks. Alternate Juror Hopkins said that the jury had been watched closer than any other in San Francisco for 25 years. "They censored our mail both incoming and outgoing," he said. "We each had a separate room at the hotel where we stayed and were watched like hawks by the four deputy sheriffs who guarded us. They certainly did their duty well. The newspapers were carefully kept from us. I have no idea of what has happened in the world for two weeks."

O'NEIL, Neb., Dec. 3.—The O'Neil Electric Light & Power company Thursday began to burn corn for fuel instead of coal in its light plant, one of the largest of its kind in this section of the country. The company found corn was cheaper and that its heating quality was satisfactory.

Tuberculosis Society Has Many Workers in the Field Selling the Little Seals to Raise Funds.

Union county is no slacker when it comes to buying the little Christmas seals which the Tuberculosis society is selling in the state to raise funds for the purpose of fighting the great white plague.

Ladies in La Grande who have charge of the work report excellent success and almost every desk in the business section has been supplied with a copious amount of the little stickers which indicate that the purchaser has made his contribution to the cause.

The little folder being circulated by the ladies contains some very good sensible thoughts, a part of which is herewith reproduced:

What is Tuberculosis?

Tuberculosis is a disease caused by a germ or tiny plant called the "tubercle bacillus." This germ enters the body usually by way of the mouth and goes to the lungs, or elsewhere and then grows and causes the disease, tuberculosis. When the disease is in the lungs it is known as pulmonary tuberculosis or consumption. The germs may go to any part of the body and these cause disease.

Up to the last generation tuberculosis was considered an incurable disease, and in fact science knew so little about it that no intelligent treatment of the disease was possible. If a patient recovered, it was something of an accident.

In 1882, Robert Koch discovered the germ of tuberculosis and soon proved that it was only through this germ that the disease could attack its victim or spread to others.

Avoid Tuberculosis.

Watch yourself—the tubercle bacillus respects no one. Keep strong—the germ cannot develop in healthy bodies.

Live, study and sleep in the fresh air—it kills germs.

Seek sunshine—it's a wonderful medicine.

Eat with clean hands—wash them. Bathe frequently—you know the adage.

Months want food—not pencils and hands.

Consult a physician—he'll tell you the truth.

Get Well. Eat wholesome food and drink water.

Live night and day in the fresh air.

Keep warm by wearing suitable clothing.

Aspire to be clean within and without.

Rest until the reserve power accumulates. Sleep as long as you like for once. Radiate optimism, faith, cheerfulness and happiness. Fight till the last bug expires. Follow the advice of a good doctor.

Plan a big program to be carried out when you shall have recovered. Be careful, take time, have patience, and grow stronger. Go to a sanatorium if possible and necessary, before it is too late. Start the fight early before the disease gets a stronghold. Forget the patent medicines or advertised cure-alls.

Protect Others. Expectorate into spittoons half filled with water, ritters, paper spittoon cups, paper or gauze handkerchiefs, or something that can be burned at once.
