

REDUCTION IN TIRE PRICES

Recent reductions in the price of tires are greatly appreciated by motorists and dealers generally, according to W. H. Bohnenkamp Co., the local Goodyear dealer.

A careful analysis of the new price reveals a great deal of interesting information. For one thing the new prices on Goodyears are lower than they have ever been before. Notwithstanding the fact that Goodyear tires have been steadily improved in quality and increased in size it is now possible to buy them in either fabric or cords at the lowest price they have ever sold for.

Another point which is liable to change the whole trend of the tire industry is the fact that it is now possible to purchase cord tires for very little less than the price of fabrics. For instance a 32x4 Goodyear All Weather cord tire has been selling previously to the drop at \$48.10. The same size and style in fabric construction sold for \$29.35, a difference in cost of \$18.75. Even with this difference nearly half the tires sold were cords. The new price list shows a reduction of nearly \$16.00 on the cords and about \$4.00 on the fabrics, the new prices being \$32.40 and \$25.45, respectively. With such a small differential it is highly probable that most motorists will choose cord tires for their regular equipment. Manufacturers have also paved the way for this inasmuch as nearly all of them have now adopted cord tires as standard equipment.

BEND, Dec. 3.—An Oregon trunk passenger train which had been buried in snow and ice near Grieda since November 19 was released Wednesday. Telegraphic communication with the outside world was restored Wednesday for the first time since the storm that began on that date.

FIVE JAPANESE DROWNED.
VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 3.—Five Japanese sailors lost their lives when the Japanese auxiliary schooner Koun Maru foundered 200 miles off Cape Flattery in a southeast gale Tuesday, according to a wireless report received Thursday. The remainder of the crew was rescued by the Japanese steamer osan Maru, outward bound from Tacoma to Japan.

First reports were that all members of the crew were saved.

Clean-Up Stolen.
JACKSON, Cal., Dec. 3.—A month's cleanup of gold amargam valued at between \$60,000 and \$70,000 was taken from the Argonaut mine here early Thursday by a gang of eight men who bound the two millmen on duty, blew open the safe and disappeared in two automobiles up the main road leading north from Jackson.

U. P. DIRECTORS RESIGN.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Otto F. Kahn and Mortimer Schiff Thursday resigned from the board of directors of the Union Pacific railroad.
