as proposed in that act. They adhered to their own Irish parliament, called the Dail Eireann, which they had set up independently as the governing body of the Irish Republic.

Truce Began in July.
That was the situation when the truce began last July, after King George had made a conciliatory speech at the opening of the new parliament in Ulster.

The conferences began in July. Both sides had at times entertained hopes of a final and satisfactory settlement probably than at any time since the Irish question became a thorn in the side of the British Empire, but those have been several crises when the negotiations seemed doomed to failure.

and by other means. They say that appropriations for a given year do not accurately reflect actual expenses for that year, pointing out that while the appropriations for this fiscal year were \$5,197,877,962, the estimated actual outlay will exceed this sum by approximately \$770,000,000.

Mostly for Wars.
Of the total estimated expenditures for 1922, approximately \$2,900,000,000 is to pay for past wars and to keep up the fighting arms of the government, leaving only about \$200,000,000 for the peacetime pursuits of the federal establishment. The estimate for the army and navy is \$801,626,107, a reduction of \$66,205,299 as compared with this fiscal year and \$956,252,741 as compared with the fiscal year 1921. The navy estimate of \$431,754,000, it is explained, does not take into account any possible reductions that might be brought about as a result of the arms conference, the total including funds for continuing the work on the ships of the 1916 program, most of which would be scrapped under the proposal made to the conference by the American government.

MEETING IN JANUARY
THE HAGUE, Dec. 5.—The first session of the Permanent Court of International Justice is to be held here in January.

The Peace Palace, which up to the present has served chiefly as an attraction to sightseers, will become the seat of the court. If the offers of the Carnegie Institution are accepted, the court will have the entire right wing of the building at its disposal.

CO-OPERATION IS PRONOUNCED

All Join to Assist Red Cross in its Thrift Shop Which Will Open for Business Tomorrow Afternoon.

There could be no better team work than the people of La Grande are displaying toward the Red Cross Thrift Shop. From every section of the city comes reports of ladies enlisted in the cause who are setting aside so much time each week to devote to the call which may be made on them. They have come forward and expressed a willingness to count them in, also. The systematic public charity which was worked out by Mrs. Catlin of the Red Cross and the Salvation Army heads has made a deep impression upon the men, for they realize that it is practical and sensible in that it prevents duplication and renders service along comprehensive lines. When this was announced through the Observer many men spoke up at once, expressing their endorsement of the plan and willingness to aid in any way they could.

The Thrift Shop is going to benefit from this sentiment. One organization that holds an annual holiday event has joined hands with the Red Cross and will make suitable gifts of food stuff and other articles using the roster prepared at the Red Cross offices. One merchant who handles large stocks of holiday goods has assured the Red Cross of his willingness to aid in a substantial manner which will be announced later.

And so it goes throughout the city—a chain of desires to help put into actual practice.

This may be a hard winter in La Grande. Some predict it will be, although thus far the suffering has not been heavy. But even if it proves to be as hard as some believe, apparently there will be not only articles to care for those who need them, but there will be personal service of both men and women of La Grande whose hearts are beating with the rhythm of practical charity so much talked of but seldom seen in operation as it is now in this city.

DROVE HOME THE SINNER'S FATE

Three Fingered Jack Has Largest Meeting of Series Last Night at the Methodist Church.

Three-Fingered Jack Godwin, the evangelist who is holding union revival meetings at the Methodist church, drove home the sinner's fate last night in what is believed to have been his best effort yet put forth in La Grande.

Early in the evening and long before time for the opening of the services the large church began to fill. Automobiles lined each side of the street for blocks and by the time the choir opened with its first song the old church was a mass of eager humanity who had assembled to hear the old-time Denver gambler tell of the pitfalls of this life and point the way to proper living.

Inspired by the sea of faces and the earnest expression of his congregation the evangelist grappled with his subject in a most enthusiastic manner. While he started with some of the usual set ways of church services he was not long in flinging ethics to the wind, for he got down to "brass tacks" and called things by the common name. He told the boys, the girls, the men and women how society is slipping and how easy it is to take the path of least resistance; then he impressed upon them strength of character needed to take the right road and urged all to do it now. Procrastination does not belong in Jack's vocabulary for he abhors the word. He believes in starting right now on a different road—the road to right living and correct thinking. His railroad experience and the knowledge of railroading equipped him to make railroad comparisons that went home to many of the congregation and his meeting last evening closed with the best demonstration yet that he is awakening people to better lives.
