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MILLIONS SPENT ON THE HIGHWAYS DURING THE YEAR

SALEM, Dec. 12.—A total of \$18,245,821.37 was spent on Oregon highways under supervision of the state highway department during the fiscal year ending November 30, 1921, according to a statement issued by Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer. This amount includes \$15,031,655.14 of state funds; \$2,181,956.65 of federal co-operative funds; \$985,831.42 of county funds and \$46,378.16 of railroad funds.

In addition the state highway department has supervised the surveys and location of market roads involving the ultimate expenditure of approximately \$2,000,000.

Construction work completed by the department during the year includes 188 miles of pavement, 499 miles of macadam and 504 miles of grading, a total of 1191 miles of improved highways, and 98 bridges, at an aggregate cost of approximately \$1,444,180.

Nunn's statement shows an overhead cost for the year of 5.98 per cent of the total expenditure, including expense of highway commission and secretary; expense of legal department, auditing, cost-keeping, testing materials, road maps and information reports; bridge designs for counties, engineering work furnished to counties, surveys and engineering for market roads; state surveys for co-operative construction, all engineering for construction on state and co-operative roads and the supervision of maintenance.

A total net earning for the year amounting to \$128,394.19 is shown by the department, Nunn said.

Love and Eugenics
Don't Agree in The
State of Wyoming

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 12.—Love laughs at eugenics here Saturday night. Attorney General W. L. Walls, in an opinion Saturday, declared the state eugenics law, enacted by the last legislature is illegal and Saturday night the county clerk was busy passing out marriage licenses without the customary physician's certificate.

The law requires that 10 days before a marriage license is granted a certificate from a physician must be presented to show freedom from venereal disease. It was modeled after the Wisconsin law, but the attorney general said that failure to mention in the title of the bill the provision for medical examination nullified the law.
