## UNION HIGH BASKETBALL

UNION, Dec. 16.—In the first of the class series the seniors defeated the juniors five 23 to 6. The seniors with Dallen, Cook, Kuhn and Johnson, all first team men of last year, fairly overshadowed the juniors who had a much less experienced bunch. At that the game wasn't so uninteresting as the score indicates. At the end of the first half the score stood 16 to 2 but in the last period the juniors whipped up and scored four points to the seniors seven.

The seniors' lineup was Cook, center, Dallen and Kuhn, forwards, V. Johnson and Phillips, guards. In the second half Maxwell was substituted and played a creditable game. The junior lineup was C. Johnson, center, Martens and Bates, forwards and Busiek and Chadwick guards.

In the second game of the series played Wednesday night the sophomores and high frosh met in a blooded battle ending in favor of the high frosh with the score 15 to 10. The first half ended with the score 10 to 11 in favor of the high frosh but the last half the sophomores failed to score while their opponents marked up five points. This makes the high frosh on an equal footing with the seniors who defeated the juniors the night before.

The game between the high frosh girls and the sophomore girls ended in a rather remarkable score, especially for a basketball game. It was 1 to 0 in favor of the sophomores. The reason for such a low score was lack of practice and the roughness of the game. In some respects it resembled a football game.

The girls have begun basketball practice and about 20 are out regularly. The class games will begin Friday and will run similar to the boys interclass games. At present the classes seem pretty well represented with the exception of the freshmen and they have several aspirants. The boys interclass series will be played this and next week, the winner receiving a cup which will remain permanently in possession of the class winning it three consecutive years. Much interest is displayed in this series besides giving the coach a lineup on the merits of his squad.

### High Mountains of Montana.

Six named peaks in Montana have elevations exceeding 12,000 feet, and several unnamed peaks rise to greater heights, according to the United States geological survey. All these peaks are in the Bitterroot National forest, in Carbon county, in the south central part of the state. The highest of these is Granite peak, 12,850 feet; the next highest is Mount Wood, 12,750 feet.

### Flea's Travel on Fleas.

A new "flea's flea" with an adventurous life history was described for the first time at a recent meeting of the Royal Microscopical society in London. The discoverer, P. Martin Duncan, F. R. M. S., explained that it started life in the underground nest of the humble bee. These nests are added by moles, and during the ascent the little mites attach themselves by means of suckers to the mole's parasite, the "great mole flea." These tiny pin points of life are obscure cousins to the scorpion, and it is believed that they travel on the mole flea until they come across a certain underground fungus, where they feed and mature.—Brooklyn Eagle.
