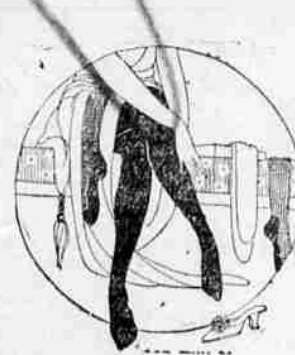

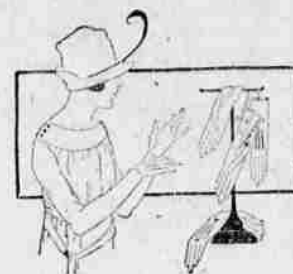

Road Bonds Sold at a Large Premium

PORTLAND, Dec. 17. — Sale of road bonds of the par value of \$560,000 at a premium of \$55,496 was accomplished by the state highway commission at its meeting Thursday, the United States National bank being awarded the entire issue on its bid of \$615,496. The tenders had been taken under advisement at the terms offered by the highest bidder was reached after lunch.

Before the bond bids were opened bond buyers requested that the bonds be sold at a less interest than advertised, 5½ and 6 per cent, basing the request on the statement that the premium on the 5½ per cent bonds would be so large that the bonds would not be as marketable as bonds with lower interest and premium.

MANY LEAVE EARLY.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 17. — Forty thousand children in Philadelphia between 14 and 17 years of age annually leave the city schools with such little fundamental education that the majority fall into featureless and dead-end jobs, declared a subcommittee of the industrial relations bureau of the local Chamber of Commerce which has completed a comprehensive study of industrial conditions.

The committee said that it is these children who swell the ranks of the discontented and who are usually the first to lose their positions in times of depression.
