In a short speech the Minister recalled how the hero of the war for Hungarian independence pronounced the dethronement of the Hapsburgs in 1849.

PATAGONIAN ROAD PROJECTED

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 20.—Patagonia, that far-away region stretching out for hundreds of miles in Southern Argentina, may be linked with what is now the thickly settled section of the country if President Yrigoyen and government officials are able to carry out their plans for constructing a system of light, narrow-gauge railways connecting with the present railroad system.

The plan is to begin as soon as possible the work on constructing lines totaling 622 miles.

At the present time Patagonia is linked with Buenos Aires only by irregular steamers, and the ranch-

ers throughout the region have great difficulty in getting their products to market.

A large part of the region is more or less barren and much that is fertile is not yet settled on account of the difficulty of transportation. Patagonia produces wool, meat some grain and other agricultural products, and is said to have a great potential petroleum production.
