OBITUARY

Ole T. Severs, a prominent resident of Cove, passed away in Portland December 16 at the home of his daughter Mrs. J. D. Stout, after a period of several weeks illness. He was born on March 23, 1845, and lived to the age of 76 years, eight months and twenty-three days.

Ole T. Severs was born and raised on a farm near Cambridge, Wisconsin. During his boyhood he attended school there and was at the Academy during the Civil War. Afterwards he graduated from the Eastman Business College of Chicago.

In 1897 he settled in Winnebago County, Iowa, where he held the office of county clerk and then county recorder for a period of thirty years. In 1875 he married Betsy Borson of Augusta, Wisconsin. After thirty years residence in Iowa Mr. Severs came to Cove, Oregon, where he made his home in his remaining years.

Episcopal services were read at Portland by Rev. Powell, formerly of Cove. The service was attended by many of his Cove friends and colleagues and by all but one of his family. The missing son was Rankin Severs of Cove.
