CHECKERED LIFE IS AT AN END

(By Associated Press) HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 22.—The recent wreck of the four-masted American schooner Carrier Dove on a coral reef off the west coast of Molokai, the "leper" of the Hawaiian group, brought to an end an adventurous and checkered sea career that belied the vessel's pacific name, and breached the days of real sailing when steam was unknown.

As cabled, the Carrier Dove went ashore while enroute from the South Sea island of Tonga to San Francisco with a capacity of cargo of 800 tons of coals. She broke up after several hours of pounding and, with her cargo, was a total loss but the crew was saved. It was the third and last time the vessel had been on the rocks. The two previous times she had been pulled off with only slight damages. On each of the occasions, however, the Carrier Dove ran into extraordinary adventures.

When she rested on the rocks at Levuka, Fiji, in February, 1920, she was extricated and her damages repaired. But Captain Gus Stoltenberg, the master, was refused permission by the British authorities to sail from the port, he said. The British authorities threatened to send a gunboat after him, the captain said, but he ran up the American flag, sailed, "and nothing came of it."

In September, 1903, the Carrier Dove had come to rest on the rocks in this time in the China Sea near Shawan. Pirate junkmen swarmed aboard, routed the crew and forced them from the vessel. This led to a report to the State Department that the ship had been lost. The pirates were forced to leave the Carrier Dove by heavy weather. Captain C. Jensen, then master, returned with some of the crew and found the vessel loaded of most of her portable fittings. A great part of her lumber cargo was removed and she was floated, being repaired and placed in commission later.

On February 14, 1905, the Carrier Dove had arrived in Honolulu harbor on a "madhouse" voyage from Biera, South Africa, with only Captain Jensen, the mate and two of the crew able to work. The vessel's log told the story of the tragedy. The remainder of the crew had either died or been left in hospitals enroute.

JOURNALIST CALLED TO HIS FATHERS

In hundreds of cities and it was his pride to tell of calling on Lincoln the morning of his inauguration and of standing beside him at the ceremony. "Let no Southern man point his finger at me," Mr. Watterston said, "because I cannot see Lincoln, for he was the one friend we had at court when friends were most in need."

When the storm of the European War broke over the word Mr. Watterston assumed an uncompromising stand in support of the cause and ideals of the Entente Allies, declaring his belief that their cause was the cause of freedom and democracy and that of the Central Empire that of autocracy. His attitude was tersely set forth in a single sentence that appeared at the end of practically every editorial he wrote on the subject for many months: "To Hell with the Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs!"

In his early years he superintended the detail of every department on his newspaper, and for more than thirty years "put the paper to press" every night.

He was born in Washington, D. C., on February 16, 1840.

Farming was the occupation of his father, the population of France in 1870.

RUSSIANS TIRE OF UTOPIA

(By Associated Press) RIGA, Latvia, Dec. 22.—Russian peasants and laborers tired of promises of a Communist utopia, and have come to the "show me" stage, Premier Nikolai Lenin said in a recent speech before a congress of political educational workers, at Moscow.

The full text of this sensational speech, part of which relating to Lenin's admissions of economic failure were cabled from Moscow at the time it was delivered, has just reached Riga, as reported by the official Moscow Pravda.

"There was a time," Lenin said, "when declarations, proclamations, decrees, etc., were necessary. We have had plenty of these. There was a time when it was necessary to show the people what we wanted to build. But can we continue to show and only tell the people what we want to build? No! Even the simplest laborer will then scoff at us, saying: 'You are always talking of what you want to do, but show us now what you can do. And if you can do nothing, then go to the devil! And he will be right.'"

Speaking about the absence of education and the prevailing illiteracy of the Russian population, Lenin said that the very fact that a commission had to be appointed for the liquidation of illiteracy shows, "to say it as gently as possible, that we are something like half-savages. For in a civilized country, it would be considered a shame to create commissions for the liquidation of illiteracy. In other countries they have schools where they liquidate illiteracy. They teach, in the first place, to read and write. As long as this fundamental problem is not solved, it is ridiculous to talk of a new economic policy."

Lenin said that Soviet laws and propaganda were good, but could not succeed until the masses of people helped the regime. Several hundred thousand "obnoxious and useless Communists," he said, should be expelled from the party. "Russia," he continued, "should have culture which will teach us to fight red tape, corruption and bribery. Experience has shown that a politically educated state knows no bribery, whereas with us, bribery is rampant."

Lenin said the government was facing three principal foes, first, Communist arrogance, second illiteracy and third, corruption and bribery.
