

OREGONIANS TO HANDLE CLUB

SEATTLE, Dec. 23.—Two Oregonians, Walter McCredie and James J. Richardson, will have a great deal to say about the handling of the Seattle club of the Pacific Coast Baseball League next season, McCredie having been named manager and Richardson business manager.

Both men formerly were with the Portland club and made records for discovering and developing new players, McCredie being particularly noted for the shortstops he sent up to the big leagues.

Among players sent to the major leagues from McCredie's team were Ivan Olson, Roger Peckinpaugh, Dave Bancroft, Charley Hollocher, Mike Mitchell, Jack Graney, Larry McLean, Stanley Coveleskie, Vean Gregg, and others. This season Herman Pilette and Sylvester Johnson, both developed by McCredie, went up for \$40,000 and players.

Richardson, it is said, found Harry Heilmann playing on the sand lots of San Francisco, saw his possibilities and signed him for Portland. Now Heilmann is the leading hitter of the American League. Carl Mays, the Bigbee brothers, Al Walters and others were signed by Richardson.

While handling Portland McCredie won five league championships, his team of 1905 being considered one of the greatest minor league clubs ever assembled. McCredie has been in baseball twenty-six years and for a few years played for the Brooklyn Nationals.

For two years Richardson has been manager of student athletics at the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, Oregon, and his departure was the cause of sorrow on the campus, for "Jimmie," as he is known throughout the Pacific Northwest, did much toward putting O. A. C. on the athletic map, besides clearing up a big debt which was hanging over the athletic department.

When Richardson left O. A. C. to join Seattle the students presented him with a life pass to all athletic contests held on the campus. It was said that Richardson's pass was the only one ever given by the Aggies to any person not an ex-college athletic star.

Paris Discards The Horse On Street

PARIS, Dec. 23.—The horse, soon will be but a memory, so far as the principal thoroughfares of Paris are concerned if plans of "traffic reform" are adopted in an effort to disentangle the traffic jams which are daily making the pedestrian's existence more uncertain.

These experts propose to bar all horse-drawn vehicles from the chief traffic arteries during the daylight hours, leaving the horse only a few hours at night in which to jog along. The traffic authorities would go farther and even banish ordinary human beings who are forced to walk. They propose putting them all underground on a moving sidewalk.

In any event those who take a gloomy view of the traffic situation see one optimistic aspect of it. They say it can't get any worse. Accidents are almost hourly occurrences on the boulevards and a tie-up is the inevitable result.

He red hands at crossings, constructed to give protection to the walkers have proved a failure. Only a heavy rain reveals their presence and even then the drivers ignore them.

"Crashing" taxicabs add to the confusion and it is further suggested that this practice be prohibited. The increase in the business has deprived taxicabs of much business and they are now forced to solicit business, a thing unnecessary since 1914.

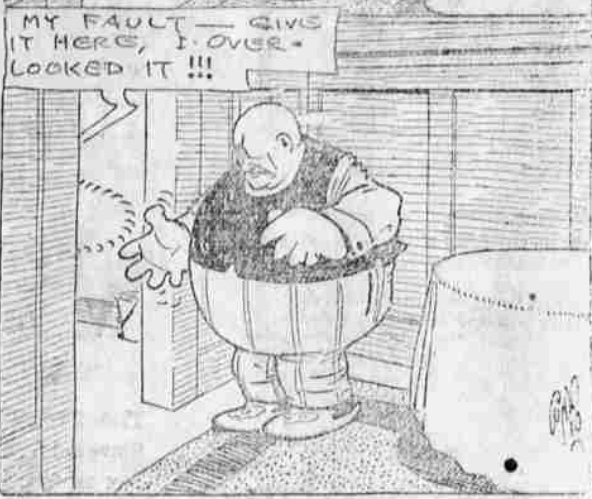

Death Of War Tax Will Benefit Railroads

PORTLAND, Dec. 23.—That the elimination of the war tax on railway freight and passenger transportation relief from which will begin January 1, will save millions of dollars to the shippers and travelers of the north west was the statement of H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the Union Pacific.

Mr. Lounsbury said yesterday that he had had compiled the amount of taxes collected on freight and passenger service for a year for the Union Pacific system only. The figures showed only the tax paid to the Union Pacific for the privilege of that system as far as the system carries. On freight in a year the tax collection has been \$4,500,000. On passenger travel the tax has been \$3,000,000.

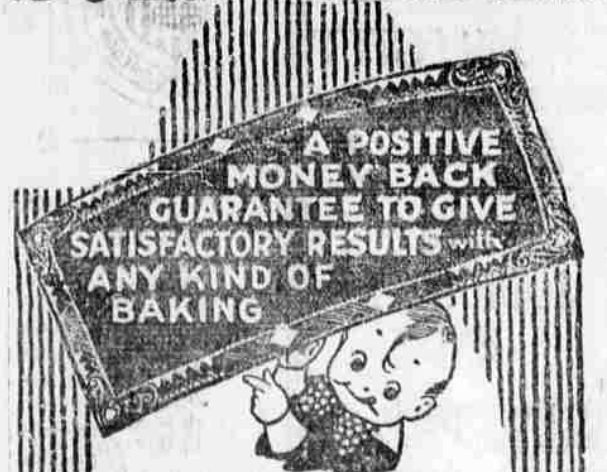
All of this money went to the government. It will now be saved the shipper and the traveler.

DEER SURVEY IS COMPLETED

After the hunters got through shooting this year there were 2075 deer left in Wallawa national forest, according to N. J. Billings, supervisor for that district, who recently completed a survey of the wild life in that domain. In addition to the deer there were 240 bears, 249 elk and 70 sheep registered

with their places of residence and family record.

This census was taken by districts and was received today at the headquarters of the state game commission. The report is as follows: District No. 1, 69 deer, 12 elk, 20 mountain sheep and 100 bears; district No. 2, 250 deer, 7 elk, 20 mountain sheep and 50 bears; districts Nos. 3 and 4, 2000 deer, no elk, 20 mountain sheep and 50 bears; district No. 5, 150 deer, 225 elk, no sheep and 20 bears; and District No. 6, 75 deer, 5 elk, no sheep and 20 bears.
