PORTLAND AREA INCREASE BIG

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—The Portland Area of the Methodist Episcopal church of which Bishop W. O. Shepherd is resident bishop, has the largest percentage increase in membership for the fiscal year ending December 1st, 1921, according to statistics compiled by Dr. Oliver S. Baketel, editor of the Methodist Year Book, New York. The total membership of the Portland Area to December 1st, is 15,177 with an increase of 2,192. This increase is in communicants or full members and not in adherents of the church.
