## "SIGN ON THE DOOR" MYSTERY REVEALED TODAY

Norda Talmadge, the charming screen star whose latest vehicle, "The Sign on the Door," directed by Herbert Brenon and released by Associated First National, will be shown at the Arcade Theatre for three days beginning today, plays the part of a young wife who becomes involved in a tragedy as a result of an innocent escapade which took place before her marriage.  
 As Ann Hunniwell, a pretty stenographer she goes with Frank Devereaux, son of her employer, to a questionable cafe in New York. In a private room he makes love to her and is repulsed. The waiter comes with a message that the place is being raided. Both are arrested: A reporter takes a flashlight of the scene, but Devereaux bribes him to give up the negative.  
 Five years later, when Ann is the wife of "Lafe" Regan, a man of high financial and social standing, Devereaux returns from France, where he has had an "affair" with the wife of a superior officer. Ann's step-daughter, Helen, becomes infatuated with Devereaux. Captain Grant arrives from France to kill Devereaux. He informs his old friend, Regan. Regan persuades Gaunt to remain at the club and goes to Devereaux's rooms to thrash him. During the altercation Devereaux gives a false version of the cafe episode, accusing Ann, and showing the flashlights as proof in the struggle that follows Regan shoots Devereaux with Devereaux's own pistol.  
 Regan does not know that his wife has witnessed the tragedy. To shield her husband, she calls the police and

takes the blame. An extraordinary denouement follows the arrival of the district attorney.  
 The production is filled with heart interest and dramatic suspense. It is just the sort of role in which Norma Talmadge is at her best.  
 "The Sign on the Door" is an adaptation of Channing Pollock's stage play of the same name, in which Marjorie Rambeau had the leading role. A late Pathe News film is also being shown.

## MORE ECONOMY URGED BY GARY

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—More work, economy and enforcement of law and order are prime essentials of the day, in the opinion of Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United Steel corporation, who today issued this statement:  
 "Readjustments and reorganizations are not complete. Difficulties still embarrass and industrial disturbances threaten.  
 "Extravagance and indolence are prevalent. Crimes and misdemeanors are common. Profiteering still exists.  
 "There is urgent need for more work, economy and saving. Stricter observance and enforcement of law are demanded.  
 "Even though the present is somewhat critical, it is certain the opportunity for established peace, progress and prosperity is better than ever.  
 "The signs which are apparent indicate that conditions, industrial, commercial, financial, social and political are improving and will be more satisfactory during the present year than during 1921. Of course, the situation may be changed by failure of the Washington conference by unfavorable legislation or by neglect thoroughly and continuously to maintain law and order. We have no present reason of expecting either of them."
