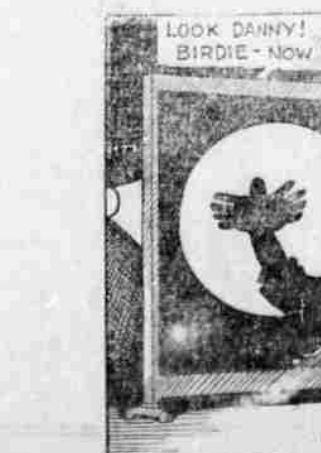

DRASTIC CUT IN BATTERY PRICES.

Price reductions ranging from 15 to 33 per cent, and bringing storage battery prices to the lowest point in years, are announced by the Prest-O-Lite Company, through Hug's Garage, their local representatives in La Grande.

A 12-volt battery for Dodge and Franklin can now be bought for \$33.90 (trade-in price), against \$43.10 yesterday, and \$56.85 a year ago, effecting a saving of \$22.95 in one short year to the car owner. Proportionate prices hold on all other types.

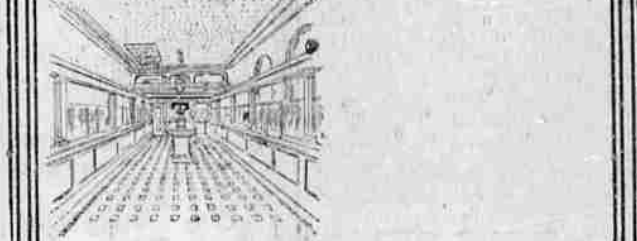
