Expenditures Of Schools Set Forth

At a recent meeting of the Ad
club Superintendent Hampton of the
La Grande schools presented figures
showing the expenditures of the
school system in a year. There are
69 people on the payroll, he declar-
ed, and those receive \$87,451.63 a
year in salaries. The material and
supply bill amounts to \$15,181.37
and the cost of repairs and main-
tenance to \$3,309.

He also called attention to the
high scholastic standard of the lo-
cal schools. The high school is an
accredited school that entitles its
graduates to enter colleges and uni-
versities in the northwest, middle
west and south without examination.

WOOL PROSPECTS GOOD.

(By Associated Press)
POSTON, Jan. 9.—Bidding was
spirited through the government wool
auction Thursday when the govern-
ment offered eight million pounds
mostly of low-grade wools. Every
pound offered was sold. The wools
went largely to dealers, although some
manufacturers, including the Ameri-
can Woolen company, were buyers.
Prices showed an advance of 20 to
25 per cent on the average as com-
pared with the previous sale in early
December. The strength of the sale
indicates the growing scarcity of
available wool. The government has
left between 10 and 11,000,000 pounds
of wool.
