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ARBUCKLE ON TRIAL AGAIN FOR SLAYING

Sixty Prospective Jurors Summoned This Morning in Court

LONGER TRIAL IS THE PREDICTION

Chief Complaining Witness Has Been Convicted of Bigamy Since Last Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—A venire of over 60 prospective jurors was called today for the second manslaughter trial of Roscoe Arbuckle in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe. Attorneys expected that the trial would be longer than the first in which the jury disagreed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, motion picture comedian, went on trial today for the second time, on charge of manslaughter growing out of the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, 24-year-old Los Angeles motion picture actress.

Arbuckle's first trial, which lasted three weeks, ended in a disagreement of the jury on December 4 after a deliberation of 44 hours. The vote, it was announced, was ten for acquittal and two for conviction.

A guest of accused.
Miss Rappe, who was a guest at an informal party given by Arbuckle in his suite at the Hotel St. Francis here Sept. 5, died in a hospital four days later. It was charged by the prosecution that Arbuckle was responsible for her death. A police court hearing followed and the comedian was held to the superior court on a charge of manslaughter.

An autopsy on Miss Rappe's body disclosed that her death resulted from a ruptured bladder which the state asserted was caused by external force applied by Arbuckle. Two prosecution witnesses, Miss Zoy Provost and Miss Alice Black, show girls, testified that Miss Rappe was alone with Arbuckle for a time in his bedroom during the party and when the bedroom door finally was opened they saw the actress lying on the bed with injury in pain.

Arbuckle took the stand at the trial and testified that he did not know that Miss Rappe had entered his room until he found her on the floor of the adjoining bathroom apparently in great pain. He said he tried to assist her in every way possible, carrying her to the bed and summoning other guests to aid her.

Mrs. Bambina Maude Delmont, a guest at the party, filed a murder charge against Arbuckle soon after Miss Rappe's death. At the police court hearing the charge was reduced to manslaughter. Police Judge Lazarus declaring that nothing was shown to connect Arbuckle with the charge murder, which was brought under California statute providing that a life taken in rape or attempted rape murder. A grand jury indictment charging Arbuckle with manslaughter was also returned and has not been disposed of.

Miss Delmont, the complaining witness, did not testify at either the preliminary hearing or the trial. During the trial, she was arrested at Madera, Cal., on a charge of bigamy but later was released on probation after she had entered a plea of guilty.

Nurse Poisoned.
During Arbuckle's trial, Mrs. Irene Morgan, a Pasadena nurse and defense witness, was poisoned in mysterious manner, and another defense witness, Mrs. Minnie Neighbors, Los Angeles, was charged with prejury. Mrs. Morgan recovered.

A charge of violating the prohibition laws, in that he possessed and served liquor illegally during his party, was filed against Arbuckle and is still pending.

Given McNab, prominent San Francisco attorney, is chief counsel for Arbuckle. He was retained by motion picture interests to handle the case.

But more serious yet is the fact that bankers complain the new dollar will not stack and others say it is too thin.

Butter Fat is at Low Level

Demoralization of Market Due to Imports of Austrian Product

The butter fat market opened this morning at 27 cents, which is the lowest price paid in the history of the valley, according to buyers. The slump in butter fat followed the break in prices on the coast and in the middle west and is due in part to the heavy shipments of butter recently received from New Zealand and Australia. Eggs have also been dropping on the coast and in eastern cities. In La Grande the prevailing retail price has been 40 cents for the past several days, although the market on the coast is reported "demoralized." While the local egg market reacts towards the coast market, the supply being all local tends to keep the price steadier, causing less suffering on the producers than where the bottom drops out and farmers find they have shipped consignments to a market that has been flooded.

Dingman, Lents, Oregon; William Bryan Lewis, Sumpter; Jack J. Lewis, Kennewick, Wash., and one brother, C. S. McDonald, also of Kennewick, Wash.

BRITON RELEASED

LONDON, Jan. 11.—Colonel John Rigelow Dodge, who was arrested by bolshevik authorities at Batum, December 9, as an alleged secret British agent, has been released and is awaiting passage from Batum to Constantinople, according to a dispatch to the Times. It was officially explained from Moscow that his arrest was an error.

London Clubs Are in Bad Condition

LONDON, Jan. 10.—It is no exaggeration to say that 90 percent of the London clubs are insolvent, an article in the Evening News states.

According to the writer, most of London's 150 clubs have been unable to pay their way the past two or three years and have been keeping up a precarious existence by increasing subscriptions and entrance fees, and by raising loans and mortgages at high rates of interest. In many cases, salaries and board of the servants absorb the whole of the subscriptions.

FRANCE WILL HAVE BRITISH AID IN WAR

Treaty Between Two Powers Submitted to London Today

HOUSE OF DEPUTIES MAY OPPOSE BRIAND

Difficulty is Mainly Over Terms of German Reparations Which Have Been Changed

CANNES, Jan. 11.—The British memorandum of the proposed Anglo-French pact, telegraphed textually to London, declares that Great Britain makes the security of France a problem of her own and that she will be ready again to throw in her forces as in 1914 if French soil is attacked. Premier Briand is going to Paris this afternoon to inform the cabinet of negotiations here and to answer criticism of the opposition and demand that the chamber of deputies support or reject him.

Opposition to Briand.
The principal differences between the premier and the opposition are regarding the new terms of payment by Germany accepted by the supreme council's experts under which France would receive less than under the previous arrangement but a greater proportion in kind. American Ambassador Harvey attended the supreme council today, having almost completely recovered from the shock of the automobile accident in which he was several days ago.

Radical Change in Women's Footwear

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—The heavy, flapping galoshes will soon lose popularity with women and girls, according to exhibitors at the National Shoe Retailers' Exposition Tuesday. They are to be supplanted by the Russian boot, according to shoe men. The foot gear on exhibition, which dealers say will detract the galoshes, is a patent leather boot topped with red leather strips.

Dentist's Power To Pull Teeth Upheld

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 11.—The state supreme court Tuesday determined that a dentist may remove a patient's teeth without consent in the exercise of his professional duties. A judgment of the circuit court of Milwaukee county, awarding \$3500 damages to Isabel Thorne, was overruled. Six of her front teeth had been extracted by Dr. L. A. Wandell against her will and without her knowledge, she alleged.
