

PERU ASKS FOR ARBITRATION

(By Associated Press)

LIMA, Peru, Jan. 11.—Peru adhered to her demand that the Tacna-Arica controversy between her and Chile be settled by arbitration. This was emphasized Saturday night by Dr. Alberto Salomán, minister of foreign affairs, who asserted Chile was prepared to adopt unscrupulous measures should a plebiscite be held to determine the future status of the two provinces. He said all political parties in Peru had approved the government's attitude.

"I have not refused the Chilean invitation to reconsider the exchanges between Lima and Santiago," he declared. "The only proviso I have laid down is that Chile should accept the only way left for settling the difficulty—arbitration."

"It is useless for Chile to continue to carry on her projects looking to direct negotiation. If Chile is acting in no good faith in Peru, let her accept arbitration."

HIGH OFFICIAL VIOLATES LAW

Aged Pioneer Injured While Trapping Alone

PENDLETON, Jan. 11.—Davy West, 86-year-old trapper and miner known to many in Pendleton, suffered a badly burned foot while trapping alone on Twelve Mile creek in Grant county, was unable to seek help for nearly three weeks and is being rescued by a crew of five men who went out from the Buffalo mine on a sled. When first discovered the aged trapper was at the K. G. Warner sheep cabin on Twelve Mile creek and had trapped to that spot through four feet of snow for a distance of 10 miles. He was unable to go farther and the sled was sent for.

Details of the misfortune suffered by the old man were brought here today by N. Berkeley, who has just returned from the mine.

Boy Shot Through Foot Accidentally

BAKER, Jan. 11.—George Phillips, 9-year-old son of Mrs. A. W. Phillips, shot himself accidentally with a .22 calibre rifle. The bullet passed through his left foot just below the ankle and it is not expected the injury will prove very serious.

The boy took the rifle from where it was hanging on the wall and loaded it from the magazine. He was putting the gun back when it was accidentally discharged.

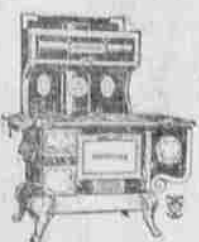

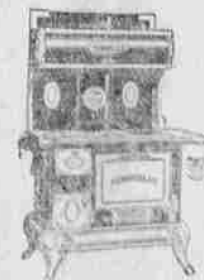

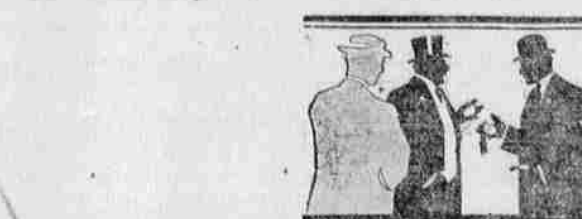
