### Average Citizen Is Poorer Than in 1921

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 11.—Per capita circulation of money in the United States declined \$6.09 during the past year, according to a statement issued today by the treasury. On January 1, 1922, the per capita circulation was \$53.03, based on a total of \$5,775,400,315 and an estimated population of 108,917,000, as compared with a per capita of \$59.12 of January 1, 1921, based on a total of \$6,340,436,718 in circulation and an estimated population of 107,249,000.

### SLOW ACTION IN JAPAN

(By Associated Press) TOKIO, Jan. 11.—Three hundred and fifty persons who applied for telephones in 1907 have just been granted them by the Central Telegraph Bureau in Tokio, says the Japan Advertiser.
