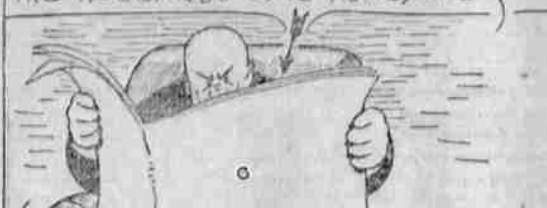

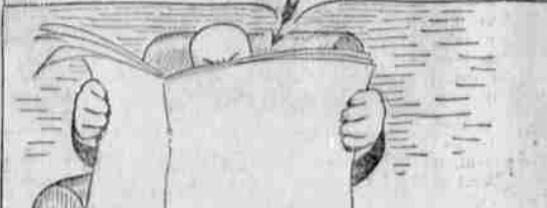

But it didn't last long, for the local team got started and the first half ended 20 to 11 in La Grande's favor. In the remaining half the two teams scored an even number of points, eleven each, making the final score 31 to 22 in favor of the La Grande five. The Joseph team showed a strong offensive but their guards were not in Coker's and Bean's class and the result was that these two fellows broke up many a promising play for the visitors.

It was a hard matter to pick out any individual star last night on the local quintet for every one of them was playing bang-up half with little to choose between them. Mays, Joseph center, starred for the visiting team.

The lineup was: La Grande—Lynch and Hough, forwards; Metcalf, center; Bean and Coker, guards. Joseph—Deaser and McCully, forwards; Mays, center; Cole (capt.) and Wilson, guards. Charles Reynolds refereed.

Tonight will find La Grande high school battling the strong Elgin team on their own floor. Coach Ledell is not promising a victory, but he states that the team will give them every thing they have and if that doesn't win it will be a general surprise. La Grande has now won three games and lost one, which is a good record for a practically new team, especially starting as hard a schedule as they did.

DEFEATED BY UNION TEAM

The Stoddard Brothers were unable to defeat the Union Legion team last night at Union. After receiving a drubbing to the tune of 31 to 13 over here the Union five came back and won from the Stoddards 20 to 15. The game was clean and fast, the close checking of the Union team being the feature that held the Stoddards from winning. The first half ended 10 to 9 in favor of the Stoddards but in the last half the Unionites staged a comeback and ran up 11 points to their opponent's five.

Just Thirty Years Ago in the Grande Ronde Valley

(January 22, 1892)

Another train wreck occurred for the second time within two weeks when No. 1, the fast mail, left La Grande five hours late and a defective rail threw it from the track this side of Umatilla. Fireman Pound, of La Grande, was killed and a newsboy, Joe Warner, was so severely scalded by escaping steam that he cannot survive. The death of Fireman Pound is deeply deplored by his fellow employees, as well as a large circle of friends in La Grande. He leaves a wife and one child to mourn his untimely death.

At the annual election of the La Grande Athletic Club held Wednesday evening the following officers were elected: F. L. Meyers, president; Dr. M. Molitor, vice president; Wm. Miller, secretary; A. B. Heulst, treasurer; and R. L. Lincoln, J. W. Knowles, F. T. Talbot and M. J. Buckley, directors.

The time card for the Elgin train has been satisfactorily arranged, or as nearly so as can be for the convenience of those concerned. The train leaves Elgin at 5:30 in the morning and arrives in La Grande in time for the main line trains at 9 o'clock. The new schedule went into effect Tuesday.

The La Grande Rod and Gun Club has ordered fifty pairs of Bob White quail, and will also procure ten pairs of Mongolian pheasants, to turn loose in the Grande Ronde valley. The birds are protected by the game laws for four years, at the end of which time it is hoped the valley will be well stocked.
