discount it through the federal reserve system or issue debentures against the loans in the form of certificates of indebtedness to be sold on the open market.

Credits Recommended.
The committee also has at its disposal the report of the joint congressional agricultural inquiry commission recommending an intermediate form of credits which would give the agricultural producers working capital. Livestock producers under one plan would have their paper discounted by the local banks and rediscounted by the farm loan banks through the federal reserve system.
