

DANZIG SPEAKS ALL LANGUAGES

DANZIG, Jan. 27.—This old German port on the Baltic, created a free city by the Treaty of Versailles in order to give the Poles access to the sea is becoming internationalized and a center of conflicting interests.

One of Danzig's largest store advertisements that nine languages are spoken by its clerks, and the colors of England, France, Poland, Italy, Sweden, Lithuania, Spain, Norway and Denmark greet visitors at the main entrance.

It is believed that the Poles and the Danzigers agree on anything, and on this account the League of Nations has a high commissioner, General Haking, an English army officer, on the ground to settle disputes when possible. The Danzigers always contend the Poles want too much and the Poles say the Danzigers continually are trying to give them the worst of it.

General Haking says relations between the two are really improving and that in the long run the Poles will have all that is due them by inter-allied agreement, that the Danzigers will go on about as usual, and that Danzig will prosper in the future as a free city just as the framers of the Treaty of Versailles intended.

But the great change in the life of Danzig during the last year and a half has not been without resentment. Recently the Danzigers have been openly opposing the influx of the Poles on the contention that unless restrictions are enforced Polish workmen will soon force thousands of German laborers out of their positions.

Thousands of Poles have entered Danzig for business purposes or in connection with government affairs by terms of conventions and agreements between Poland and the free city of Danzig under the new arrangements.

Danzig has its own postage stamps, but the German mark continues as the city's currency. In many connections where the Danzigers have the upper hand the name of the city is spelled "Danzig," which is German, but wherever the Poles have the say it is spelled "Gdansk," which is Polish. Danzig's newspapers boast of the town's cosmopolitan aspect brought about as an outcome of the war. A touch of night life and ratty has been given the city by introduction of cabarets and at Zongot, a suburb, gambling resorts by the sea have become quite famous throughout central Europe.

The Forum

After reading the anonymous letter published in your good paper the issue of January 20th, I feel that in justice to my friends who selected me to act as referee and for the good of the game, that I should say word correcting the general tenor of the article, which was misleading. A few seconds after Karther was fouled he was examined by two reputable physicians, Drs. Vehrs and Luedis, who found him injured and unable to continue the bout.

As to the referee seeing the foul that injured Karther, he did see it and recognized it as a foul, and would have disqualified Dempsey and given the decision to Karther the moment he was struck low under other circumstances. This match, however, was being conducted under unusual conditions, following the confusion and wrangling at the ringside over the selection of the referee and judges. It is customary in many states in case of a foul (always granting that same might be delivered by accident) to retire the contestants to their corners, take out the time, and permit the injured man to rest five minutes, have him examined, and if not injured too seriously, continue the bout. This plan was followed by the writer believing it would be more satisfactory to all concerned, as well as to get the benefit of the opinion of the two judges.

As to whether or not the referee was on the square: that is a matter we will leave entirely to those who have known him, and have been associated with him in business and sports in this city for the past ten years. For the enlightenment of the stranger, who wrote the article for The Observer, I might add I shall be pleased to compare my standing as a business man and an enthusiastic supporter of clean amateur and professional sports, having boxed in public here and elsewhere many times purely for the love of the game, against his record as a "sportman."

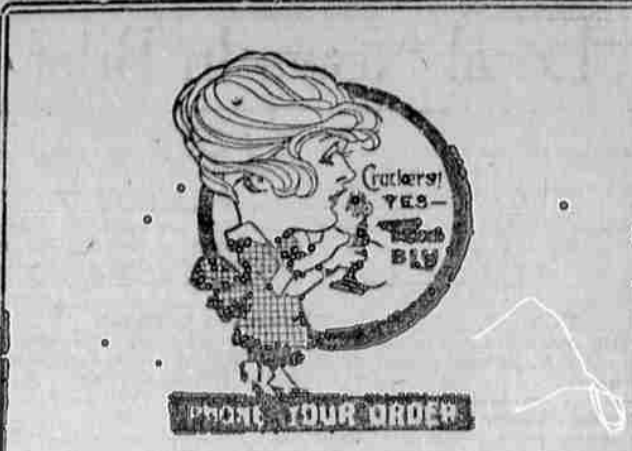
