NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Justice Gray in the Manhattan supreme court Tuesday laid prospective alimony seekers that after a separation or divorce, they could not expect to be supported in the luxurious style to which they had become accustomed during the marriage.
"It is not the policy of the law," he declared, "that a woman who is seeking to end the marriage contract shall have all the luxury of

marriage. She cannot expect all of the extras that a loving husband would naturally bestow upon her if the two were living contentedly together."
