But Taylorville learned of the plan, obtaining nine college stars and not only defeated Carlinville, but was said to have won nearly \$50,000 by covering every Carlinville bet made.

Then Notre Dame players were in the Carlinville lineup, according to statements by citizens, while the nine disqualified Illinois men played on the Taylorville eleven.

In the Carlinville lineup, according to persons associated with the team, were Gus Deach, member of the American Olympic team and world champion 440-yard hurdler; Chester Wynne, selected by some as all-western conference fullback; and John Mohardt, all-American selection of several football elevens. All played on the Notre Dame eleven last fall.

SNOW HELPS WINTER WHEAT IN NORTHWEST. (Continued from Page One.)

abandonment will probably be heavy. Recent conditions are reported as being quite favorable for the crop in the far western states.

The condition of the rye crop continues favorable in the leading producing states. Considerable damage from drought is reported in Nebraska.

The picking and ginning of the cotton crop is practically completed. Due to the favorable weather the picking was completed earlier than usual and fields have been picked unusually clean resulting in increased yield.

Non-cotton producing zones have been established in parts of Grayson, Collin, Ellis and Liberty Counties in Texas where pink bollworm infestation had been discovered.

The preparation of the ground for the spring crop of Irish potatoes is about finished in Florida and planting has commenced in the southern section. The present prospect indicates that an increased acreage will be planted. Most of the crop is still in the farmers' hands in Wisconsin, but is moving to the market in fair amounts from the New England states.

Interest in the growing of sweet potatoes is reported to be increasing in Louisiana.

Eastern Fruit Hurt. The cold weather following the warm December rains was generally beneficial to deciduous orchards in California by preventing premature budding. The harvesting of southern navel oranges is well started; the size of the fruit has been improved by the rains. The rains followed by cool weather have been beneficial to the citrus fruits in Florida. Strawberries are moving freely from the Plant City section. Apples have mostly been shipped out from the New England states. The productive capacity of peach and apple orchards in that section has been materially lowered for the next few years as the result of the damage from the recent ice storm.

All classes of live stock are generally in good condition due to the mild winter and abundant feed. Very few losses from epidemic diseases are reported, but some losses are reported from forage poisoning and from feeding moldy corn. The lambing season is in progress under favorable conditions in California.

Young clover generally entered the winter in excellent condition. The supply of hay and rough feed is abundant in most sections. Recent rains have benefited the ranges in Texas. Winter pastures in the lambing ground of Arizona are reported excellent.
