## TRAINING COST HAS JUMPED

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The cost to the government for the vocational training of men who were disabled in the World War jumped more than two million dollars between the months of September and November, according to figures prepared by the U. S. Veterans' Bureau.

Col. Charles E. Forbes, director of the bureau, attributes this increase directly to the "clean-up" campaign in which thousands of disabled war veterans, ignorant of the assistance the government offers them were discovered and placed in schools and shops, where they are receiving instruction to overcome the handicaps of their disabilities.

On September 1 there were 82,728 men receiving training under the direction of the bureau.

## CAMPAIGN TO STOP WASTE

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 31.—A campaign to stop waste through careless handling, packing and stashing of freight is being conducted by the New York Central railroad company. T. A. Ward, special representative of the freight claim department of that railroad told Cleveland shippers at a conference recently.

More than \$100,000,000 was lost by the various railroads last year through strayed freight and damage caused by packing, Mr. Ward said, while in 1920 the loss was \$100,000,000. Out of every \$100 received in freight revenues the New York Central in 1920 paid \$1.03 in claims, he said.

## ROOSEVELT WAS MODEST

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The modesty of the late Theodore Roosevelt in connection with his success in exploration of the "River of Doubt" is revealed in a letter he wrote soon after he returned from South America to Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer.

The letter has been placed on exhibition at the public library in the exhibit of the Roosevelt Memorial association. It reads:

"My own deeds need no special recognition. About all I would say of myself is that, compared with other presidents, prime ministers and the like I did some work worth doing. I do not come as Colonel Roushou does, in the explorer class, which would include you and Perry

and Amundsen and Ranson and Scott and Shackleton and Livingstone and Baker and Grant and Hedden and other men who did big things. I am glad I had a chance to explore an unknown river and put it on the map.

"I was past middle age at the time and knew this would be the last thing of the kind I could hope to do. In my case the exploration was its own reward."

### WIDOW A SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Mrs. Helen Knickerbocker, 84, widow of Henry Knickerbocker, millionaire paper manufacturer, committed suicide Monday night, according to the assistant medical examiner by jumping from the window of her apartment on the sixth floor of an apartment house.

Mrs. Knickerbocker's husband died 15 years ago.
