RESTRICTIONS ARE BROADENED

Supreme Court Makes It Harder to Put Intoxicating Liquor into Throats of Thirst.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Intoxicating liquors stored in government bonded warehouses can not be withdrawn by the owners for their personal use, the supreme court Monday held, in a decision delivered by Justice McKenna and dissented to by Justice McReynolds. Such liquor can only be transported from the bonded warehouses, Justice McKenna stated, "to a wholesale druggist, for sale to him for purposes not prohibited."

The court in a previous decision held that owners could withdraw from private warehouses liquor for their own consumption or for the use of their family or their bona fide guests. Monday's ruling makes a wide distinction between private and bonded warehouses. Justice McKenna said "mere ownership was not the equivalent" to possession, and declared that under the Volstead law "there must be ownership and possession in one's private dwelling, and that character can not be assigned to the bonded warehouses of the government."

Efforts To Cover Up Loss of Evidence Leads To The Jail

(By Associated Press) SAN JUAN, P. R., Feb. 1.—George Shanton, chief of the insular police, has been fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to serve 48 hours in jail before February 4, for contempt of court, Shanton was adjudged in contempt after the receipt of a letter from him by Federal Judge Odell, in which Shanton asked for a court order authorizing the destruction of evidence seized in cases arising out of the Volstead law. Shanton admitted in the letter that this evidence had disappeared from his custody.

An indictment for perjury was returned against Jaime Gonzalez, district police commissioner, in connection with a grand jury investigation of violations of the Volstead act.

GARMENT WORKERS STRIKE

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Six thousand women and girls employed in shops in the lower Fifth avenue district were ordered on strike Monday by the Ladies' Waist and Dress Makers' union, as a protest against a proposed 25 per cent wage reduction.

REFUSES TO SIGN CONTRACT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Secretary of the Interior (Fall) Monday declined, on behalf of the government, to sign the contract for the purchase from the Idaho Power company of its two power plants and other property at American Falls, solely on the ground that there is no money available with which to make the necessary payments. The reclamation fund is depleted, and therefore the government has no cash on hand to make first payment of two hundred fifty thousand dollars.

Irishmen companies of Snake valley have fallen down on their promised payments, and there is no money forthcoming from that source, therefore the secretary held he could not, in good faith, sign a contract, notwithstanding options given by the power company expire Tuesday.

Secretary Fall, however, is hopeful the matter may be worked out, and he will therefore ask for a renewal of the option for another 60 days. Whether or not this extension can be obtained depends largely on the attitude of the Guarantee Trust company of New York, which holds the bonds of the power company.

Secretary Fall, before announcing his decision, gave an extended hearing to Senators Murah and Gooding, Irrigation Engineer Swendsen of Idaho, W. E. Sheppard of Twin Falls, Director Davis of the reclamation service, Assistant Secretary Finney was also present.

Text of Treaty Put Into Final Form Last Night

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The text of the five-power naval treaty, to carry into effect the capital ship settlement, limitations placed on auxiliary war craft, and the "status quo" agreement regarding Pacific fortifications, was put into final form Monday and will be placed before the world at a plenary session of the arms conference Wednesday.

Final agreement on the fortifications article for which the only provision remaining incomplete came after Japan had suggested and the other powers had agreed that the American Aleutian Islands, a part of Alaska, should be included in the area in which no further fortifications or naval bases are to be erected.

Senate Leaves Its Hands Off Foreign Debt Commission

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—By fairly decisive votes, the senate Monday refused either to require congressional approval of the agreements to be entered into with debtors or nations by the proposed allied debt refunding commission or to limit authority of the commission in deferring the time when interest payments on the eleven billion dollar debt shall begin.
