WILD MAN IS SHOT DEAD

Morrow County Terror Is Killed after Battle on Sunday With Posse.

HEPPNER, Ore., Feb. 2.—"The Wild Man," who has terrorized the upper Butter creek section of this county for three years, was instantly killed Sunday in a battle with an armed posse, which had tracked him from the Joe M. Hayes' sheep camp.

The chase started Saturday night after fugitive had raided the sheep camp and carried away an army rifle and a quantity of provisions.

With his pursuers close upon his trail, the fugitive sought refuge behind a tree and was drawing a bead on the posse when a bullet from the rifle of Archie McCampbell, government hunter and trapper, found its mark in his forehead. Death was instantaneous.

Other members of the posse were Charles McDevitt, rancher, and J. C. Whittington, employe of the Dilard French ranch.

The dead man has been a mystery in the county for the last three years. No one can give any information concerning his identity. The opinion is expressed that he was an escaped convict inmate of some insane asylum or sanitarium.

Several times he has been nearly captured, only to escape. Only the day before his death, McDevitt and Whittington took him into custody, disarmed him and sent for a wagon to convey him to Heppner. But

While the men were waiting for the wagon, "the wild man" overpowered his guard and escaped.

The body was brought here yesterday by Coroner Case. No marks of identification can be found about the man's body and his identity will probably never be determined.

PEARL HARBOR TEAM LEADING

HONOLULU, T. H., Feb. 2.—The Pearl Harbor navy yard team, island football champions, added another laurel to its collection on January 18, when it defeated the army eleven from Schofield Barracks in the annual service championship game. The score was 18 to 2.

A forward pass of 33 yards scored navy's first touchdown in the initial period. The army held the navy for the next two periods but in the final quarter the navy scored two touchdowns, the first on a forward pass of 48 yards and the second when the army, punting from behind its own goal line, fumbled. Navy men falling on the ball.

The army's score came in the final period when the soldiers marched down the field to the navy's goal line, where they lost the ball on downs, but a bad navy pass resulted in a safety.

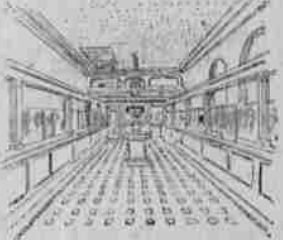
