DRAKE LED IN SERVICES

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—First church services in English in what is now the United States were held near San Francisco in 1579 by Sir Francis Drake on the first trip an Englishman made around the world, according to the Newberry Library here.

Drake returned to Plymouth, his home city and starting point, in September of 1580, just 40 years to the month before the Pilgrim Fathers sailed from there and five years before Sir Walter Raleigh's first body of settlers put out.

Drake was a fighting Puritan, leading the British later in the crucial hours against the Spanish Armada, and this first American church service in the English tongue was directed by the Puritan chaplain to the expedition.

After a terrific struggle to get around the end of South America, Drake had plundered the Spaniards up the west coast unaware of danger, and continuing north had passed shores yet unknown to Spain. Turned back by the cold as he began to approach Canada he put into a small creek or bay on the northern side of the Golden Gate before striking out across the uncharted Pacific.

It was on June 17, 1579, that Drake anchored on the California coast. He landed his men on the 21st and on the 23rd, after the friendly Indians had lacerated themselves to pay the white man homage, Francis Fletcher, the chaplain records:

"This bloudie sacrifice (against our wills) being thus performed, our General, with his companie, in the presence of those strangers, fell to prayer; and by signs in lifting up our eyes and hands to heaven, signified unto them that that God whom we did serve, and whom they ought to worship, was above; beseeching God, if it were His good pleasure, to open by some meanes their blinded eyes, that they might in due time be called to the knowledge of Him, the true and over living God; and of Jesus Christ whom he hath sent, the salutation of the Gentiles."

"In the time of which prayers, singing of Psalmes, and reading of certain chapters in the Bible, they sat very attentively; and observing the end of every pause, with one voice still cried, 'Oh,' greatly rejoicing in our exercises. Yea, they took such pleasure in our singing of Psalmes, that whenever they resorted to us, their first request was commonly this, 'Gnath,' by which they intreated that we would sing."

Drake tarried just a month, setting sail on July 23, after naming the country New Albion. The year after the Gold Hind dropped anchor again at Plymouth, he was elected mayor of the city, and served 340 years ago.

Fiume President Is Object of a Bomb

FIUME, Feb. 2.—An attempt was made on the life of President Zanella of the independent state of Fiume, when a bomb was thrown at his automobile. The president was not injured.

Prof. Ricardo Zanella was one of the leading opponents of Gabriele d'Annunzio while the latter was in Fiume. He occupied the Fiume city hall in April of last year, and was elected president of the independent state by the constituent assembly on October 6.

CONFEDERATE COIN PASSED

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, Feb. 3.—Another issue of United States Confederate money, in \$10 bills, has been put on the market in Germany, and several prominent merchants have been victimized to the extent of thousands of dollars. Scores of others have accepted the bad bills in smaller amounts.

A few months ago the Confederate money, suspiciously bright and clean, was passed quietly around to unsuspecting shopkeepers and to even a few visiting Americans who displayed carelessness in making change. At that time a warning was issued by the banks and the newspapers advised readers to use discretion.

The latest known victim is a merchant who sold a bill of goods for \$300 in cash and accepted the Confederate currency. He appealed to the American Association of Commerce and Trade in Berlin.

The association, as a result of these raids on German marks and German goods by the Confederate money vendors, has issued a warning to its clientele, declaring "the only way to avoid such losses is to accept all payments for goods through a bank, especially where foreign currency comes into question."

German merchants recently also have been accepting counterfeit German 50-mark notes, many of which are still in circulation although the police succeeded in capturing the counterfeiters.
