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HILGARD ICE CROP GOOD

HILGARD, Feb. 9.—Fred Holthke rode down from Starkey Sunday expecting to take No. 23 for Pendleton. He missed the train by about five minutes so continued on to La Grande to take a later one. The road to Starkey is reported very bad on account of snow and much of the way it is badly drifted, this being the cause of Mr. Holthke's delay, as the trip took several hours longer than was expected. Five or six additional men besides the regular employees have been put to work on the railroad shoveling snow. For several days it has been very difficult to keep the track and switches in good condition. The snow report wired to the meteorological station, Portland, for 8 a. m.
